POLISH CITY IS FREE FROM RULE OF GERMANY

POZNAN, Poland. (By Associated Press)—Poznan, which for more than a hundred years under German rule was known as Posen, is undergoing many alterations as a result of the outcome of the war and the peace conference which gave Poznan back to Poland. Just recently, the task of changing the name of every street in town from German to Polish was completed, the task having been worked out by a commission which began its duties soon after Poznan became a city of the new republic.

One of the principal thoroughfares which had been known as Berliner strasse has been renamed the street of "December twenty-seventh," this being what is considered the very last day of the Germans in Poznan. A great square in the center of the city, which since 1793 excepting an eight year interval after Prussia's defeat by Napoleon (that being the year the Germans came to Poznan) had been called Wilhelm platz, is now known as Liberty place. And a great statue of Frederick III which stood for years in Wilhelm platz, long ago disappeared, having been torn down by Polish residents of Poznan during the night of December 27, 1918, when there were riots and much street fighting between German and Polish subjects, the upshot of the demonstration convincing German officials that it would be useless to endeavor further to continue Poznan in so-called German territory. The German soldiers began withdrawing that night. Gradually since then German residents have been leaving. Many of them were born in Poznan or vicinity.

Within the past 14 months it is estimated that approximately 27,000 Germans have departed from Poznan, most of them being officials who held government positions under the German regime, and their families, and officers of the German army. Poznan city officials estimate that about 37,000 persons have moved to Poznan in that time, the majority of these having come from Congress Poland.

Poznan today is a city of about 170,000 inhabitants and considered by Germany prior to the outbreak of the war as the strongest fortified city on its western frontier. All the old forts, redoubts and batteries built by the Germans still stand.

When the Germans were in control Polish classes in the schools were forbidden. German is spoken so generally in Poznan, however, that even under the white and scarlet flag of the new republic it is taught in a certain number of schools.

BRAZIL BETTERING ARMY

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 10. (By Mail.)—Results of a French military mission which has been in Brazil for several months are shown here by inauguration of a military staff college in this city and opening of a finishing course for officers. President Pessoa attended the opening ceremonies. General Gamelin is head of the French mission.

Perry from Klamath Falls and W. H. Bond from Bend.

MILLION ACRES OF ALASKA SURVEYED

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, May 15. (By Mail.)—According to the report of Alexander T. Vogelsang, acting secretary of the interior, over 1,000,000 acres of agricultural land has been surveyed in the territory of Alaska to the end that it may be available for entry and patent under the public domain laws. A considerable portion of this land is within country traversed by or tributary to the government railroad now being constructed in Alaska.

Under the coal lands leasing law enacted in October, 1914, coal lands in the Bering river, Cook Inlet, Matanuska and Nenana coal fields have been divided into leasing blocks or units, ready for sale. The two last named fields are tributary to the government railroad.

As soon as arrangements are completed for traffic on the government railroad large numbers of settlers are expected to rush into the agricultural districts.
