EMPLOYMENT OFFICE OPENS

An employment office that will furnish labor of all kinds and in all quantities will be opened at once in the Arcade Hotel, 1023 Main street by Chris Blanas. The local office will be a branch of the Western Labor Employment bureau of Sacramento, operated by A. Mitchell, who also has employment offices in Stockton and Fresno, California, and in Denver, St. Lake and other places. Through his connection with the Sacramento office Mr. Blanas is confident that he can at all times secure any number of men, for big industrial plants and construction jobs as well as securing competent help for positions requiring different sorts of technical skill.

The office will supply positions for women as well as for men. Mr. Blanas has filed his bond with the state labor bureau and has also filed affidavits from ten freeholders that he is a responsible citizen and will conduct the offices with honest dealing toward all parties and in accordance with the regulations of the labor bureau and the laws of the state.

STATE C. OF C. TO CANVASS FOR KLAMATH QUOTA

J. G. Stafford and Samuel Haight, representing the Oregon state chamber of commerce, will arrive in this city next Tuesday, June 15, to direct the intensive canvass here in connection with the state-wide expansion movement of the state chamber. The state chamber representatives will be assisted in their work here by the Klamath Falls executive committee, appointed by the state chamber to co-operate with it in its canvass to raise this \$450,000 for its development work.

The Klamath Falls committee consists of E. T. Ludden, chairman; A. M. Collier, vice chairman; O. D. Burke, H. N. Moe and C. F. Stone. Endorsement of the state-wide movement of the Oregon state chamber of commerce now in progress, to raise a budget of \$450,000, covering a three-year period to carry on its development work, has been given by Leslie Rogers, president of the Business Men's association and cashier of the First National bank, and George J. Walton, division manager of the California-Oregon Power company.

In endorsing the work of the state chamber and its present canvass to raise a budget by popular subscription, Mr. Rogers said: "I heartily recommend the state chamber of commerce as a body well organized to assist in the up-building and promotion of the general welfare of Oregon. In recommending the state chamber of commerce, I know of the great advantage this organization can be to the local chambers of commerce situated in the different cities of Oregon."

The endorsement given by Mr. Walton is as follows: "Permit me to say that I appreciate the necessity of the field in which you are engaged being covered in the state of Oregon. There is no doubt of the added efficiency that would be attained by the various local commercial bodies having a central organization, through which to operate. This has proven necessary in other organizations, such as fraternities and churches, and we not only endorse your existence, but feel that you are a necessity to the life of the local organizations."

TELEPHONE CO. WILL BUILD NEW CIRCUITS

By August 1 Klamath Falls will have two copper wire "Class A" circuits connecting with the outer city next Tuesday, June 15, to direct the intensive canvass here in connection with the state-wide expansion movement of the state chamber. Material is on hand and work on the new line will start within a week or two.

The two wires will be stretched on the same poles and will connect with the main system at Yreka, by way of Weed. From here to the California line the wires will be strung on the telephone company's Keno line. From the boundary to Yreka they will be stretched on Western Union poles. Only about 10 miles of new poles will need to be set in the entire distance of 120 miles.

At present the city's only telephone connection with the world is through Ashland and the Ashland circuit is not up to date. It answers well enough for short calls but when the Yreka circuit is in Mr. Ludden promises the community long distance communication "as is real long distance." For instance before breakfast chats with a friend in New Orleans or New York will not only be possible but he predicts that they will soon cease to be novel after the new line gets to working well.

NO TAKING OF FAWNS ALLOWED

A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden, has issued the following circular, frowning upon the practice of taking fawns that are apparently orphaned and keeping them in captivity. He says:

"In past seasons there has been many instances of people capturing young fawns and then asking permission from the department to hold and rear them. Two such instances have occurred so far this season.

"It is the consensus of opinion that the mother deer knows where her young ones are at all times and that if the fawns are unmolested the mother will find and provide for them. This will conserve the deer which are the property of the state.

"Therefore, except in instances where the mother is known to be dead, no permission will be granted by this department to hold deer taken during closed season and the law which covers the taking of deer during closed season will be enforced."
