WORK STARTS ON NEW \$100,000 DORMITORY

CORVALLIS, June 18.—Building operations have started at the college. Ground is being broken for the second unit of the home economics building which will constitute the main division when the structure is completed. Plans are being drawn for a \$100,000 dormitory for women by J. V. Bennes of Portland, architect. Work on this structure will be pushed to the utmost so that the housing problem will be solved by the opening of the school year. L. M. Traver of Salem is in charge of the building work.

The new home economics unit will provide a tea room covering the entire third floor, four large sewing laboratories on the second floor, a suite of administrative offices, a lecture room, rest room and kitchen on the first floor and four large lecture rooms in the basement.

WORLD'S POOREST CITY IS MADE RICHEST BY TOURIST TRAVEL

From the poorest republic in the world to the richest is what tourists travel did for Switzerland. That little republic practically unknown a century ago is now recognized the world over as a playground for tourists because its scenic beauties were capitalized.

Data showing what the tourist business has done for Switzerland has been prepared by Alfred A. Aya representing the Swift interests in Oregon and turned over to the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce to be used in connection with its state-wide expansion campaign now in progress.

It has a direct bearing on the campaign by reason of the fact that one of the chief arguments being used by the State Chamber is that cities are spending huge sums to advertise their interests along civic industrial lines.

In the article prepared by Mr. Aya showing the economic value of tourist travel he says:

"It is estimated that tourists annually spend more than \$750,000,000 in the United States. Of this sum it is estimated Maine and Colorado receive close to \$50,000,000; the New England states close to \$100,000,000; Florida close to \$200,000,000 and southern California close to \$300,000,000—while in 1918 it was estimated that Oregon with scenery second to none in the world received less than \$5,000,000 from this source.

"The best example in the world of the possibilities of the tourist business is Switzerland, with an area of 15,965 square miles, or about one-third larger than Harney county in eastern Oregon.

"The Swiss did not consciously begin development of the tourist business until about 100 years ago, starting with the single guest in the spare room until today the little republic has, according to the latest hotel guide, 359 hotels and doubles its population annually through the tourists. It is said the little village of St. Moritz has few over fifty native population, but 2700 beds for tourists."

Specific cities cited by the State to advertise their possibilities include Chamber that are spending huge sums San Francisco which is now raising a fund of \$250,000; Seattle now engaged in raising \$250,000 and New Orleans which put \$100,000 into an advertising campaign.

WAR DEPARTMENT HONORS O. A. C.

CORVALLIS, June 18.—Oregon Agricultural college is designated as distinguished college nineteen twenty. The secretary of war extends congratulations to you and all concerned upon high standard of efficiency attained by military department in your institution—P. C. Harris, the Adjutant General.

This is a telegram received by President W. J. Kerr from Washington, D. C., indicating that O. A. C. has been placed among the 15 institutions of the country obtaining the greatest efficiency in military work. The college is one of few institutions of the United States to be picked to organize as many as five of the R. O. T. C. The confidence of the war department in the character of work done here was also indicated through the equipment provided which totaled more than \$1,000,000 in value.

Seven regular army officers on the average were stationed at the college this last school year, together with 40 enlisted men.

Interest in military work on the part of the students has been considered particularly keen in view of the slump in interest in this type of

training since the signing of the armistice. Enrollment in the various units was as follows: Infantry 500; field artillery, 300; engineer, 150; motor transportation corps, 140; cavalry, 75.
