THE DALLES TO HAVE NEW NATIONAL BANK

THE DALLES, June 15.—Charter will be issued to the Citizens' bank of the Dalles under the national bank system, according to authentic but unofficial assurances received today by men behind the financial project.

Forty business men of this city are behind the Citizens' bank. When Will H. Bennett, state bank examiner, reviewed the local banking field, he refused the state bank charter on the ground that the Citizens' bank was not needed.

The backers of the state bank plan appealed their case to the state bank board, but accomplished nothing. It was charged that the Citizens' bank was a spite institution launched to forestall the Wasco County bank which has just opened its doors. On

the other hand, it was contended the Citizens' bank was first conceived two years ago last May, more than a year before the Wasco County bank took the field.

The chartering of the Citizens' bank will give The Dalles four banks, but the field, according to the national bank examiner who canvassed this section, is adequate since this city boasts resources comparable to assets of cities possessing 30,000 inhabitants.

MARSHFIELD, June 15.—The Marshfield board of education calls upon the people of the city to vote nearly \$80,000 for support of the three city schools at the election June 21. Of this amount, \$59,000 is for teachers' salaries, \$5,000 for janitor service, upkeep \$9,000, and \$3,000 for fuel and phones. An item of \$1,500 is for street paving in front of the high school building. Alterations in building is contemplated to cost \$1,000.
