NO SPECULATION IN COLUMBIA BASIN LAND

SPOKANE, June 19.—To prevent speculation in lands of the Columbia basin project and to permit actual settlers to acquire farms at present prices when water is available, will be the policy of the Columbia basin survey commission, Marvin Chase, chairman of the commission and state hydraulic engineer, declared, following a recent commission meeting in Spokane.

"Through co-operation of government, state and railroad officials, it will be possible absolutely to fix prices on sufficient areas within the Columbia basin to prevent speculation to the detriment of prospective settlers," he said.

The Columbia basin survey commission has made a study of land values in all parts of the project, according to Mr. Chase, and has determined that arid lands for sheep grazing purposes are worth now

from \$3 to \$5 an acre; lands producing small wheat crops in years of more than average rainfall, \$10 to \$15 an acre and improved lands, \$20 to \$35 an acre.

"Fully 20 per cent of the land in the project will be controlled as to price and when settlement is commenced, or if sales are attempted before the project becomes assured, it will be possible to head off the speculator who may desire to reap an unholy profit from the ignorant or ill-advised purchaser," Mr. Chase declared.

"Those who contemplate purchase of land within the Columbia basin with the expectation of irrigation in the near future should be advised that it may be some years before active work could be undertaken, even if conditions prove favorable."

BAKER, June 18.—Reports from the cattle districts around McEwen, Ore., received here Tuesday, were that large numbers of cattle are dying on the ranges from unknown cause. Investigations were said to be in progress, in an effort to learn whether the cattle were being poisoned.

MARSHFIELD, June 18.—The Minard logging camp on the north Ten Mile lake has closed for an indefinite period, just after having placed a logging railroad to a fine tract of spruce and fir timber, for lack of railroad cars and because the price of lumber has dropped.

NEW ORLEANS, June 19.—A wedding ceremony in St. Louis cathedral was postponed several hours today because the officiating priest, Father Antoine, of the Order of Oblate Father of Mary Immaculate declared the bride immodestly attired and violated a recent order of Archbishop Shaw of the diocese of New Orleans relative to wearing apparel.

The priest declared the bride appeared to him "so shocking that he had the sexton put out the lights so that she might retire and properly clothe herself."

Although he declined to divulge the name of the bride, he declared she "wanted to fly in society style at her wedding, much to her disgrace."
