**DEMOCRATIC CONTROL FOR STATE CHAMBER**

**Subscribers to Budget Will Have Voice in Matter of Expenditures.**

"After I have subscribed to the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, what part will I have in the organization?"

This question is frequently heard in connection with the State Chamber expansion movement now in progress.

The answer is that all subscribers will have a voice in saying how the money will be spent. By this and other methods the fundamental democracy of the organization is assured. Of course the Board of Directors, to which every member is eligible, will actually expend the funds of the organization; but they will be guided by their expenditures by the wishes of the subscribers.

To determine what the subscribers want the State Chamber to do, group meetings will be held in every center of population in the state, when all subscribers will be called together and asked to answer, in writing, the following questions:

1. What can the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce do to improve conditions of opportunities to your own line of business or profession?

2. What do you believe the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce should do to advance the interests of your own community?

3. What in your opinion as a citizen, is the thing of first importance for the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce to do for the good of the state as a whole?

After these group meetings have been held under the direction of the executive committee in charge of the campaign, each district will select one representative to attend a convention with the officers and directors of the State Chamber, and the answers to the questions will be formulated into a program of activities designed to unite the entire state on definite tasks.

The program of work will also control expenditures. When work is started on this program the directors will follow their present practice of submitting questions of wide importance by means of referendum.

The Directors represent every city and county in the state. Representation on the Board is arranged geographically and not based on population. Eastern Oregon is represented by five Directors, Western Oregon by five, Multnomah County by two, and there are three at large; making a total of fifteen, which avoids the possibility of control by any one section.

To sum up: The State Chamber will do what the subscribers themselves say should be done. It will function through a Board of Directors elected by delegates and officers, including an executive secretary elected by the Board. Voting will be done by constituent members. Individual subscribers help make up the program of activities and carry them to completion through committee service.

**MIDDLEWEIGHT BOUT BETWEEN CHAMPIONS**

POCATELLO, Idaho, June 21.—Mike O'Dowd, former middleweight champion of the world, and Gordon McKay of Pocatello, middleweight champion of the northwest, are to meet here in a 12-round bout on either July 3 or 5.

The winner of this match, it is expected, will meet Johnny Wilson.

McKay has fought over 200 battles in the west, including San Francisco, Portland, Spokane and Salt Lake, and has never lost a decision nor been knocked down. He fought "Mickey" King at Mackay and knocked him down in the second round, the only time King was ever knocked down, and won the decision at the end of 15 rounds. He also won decisions over Barriean, the Canadian champion, and Eddie Nugent of New Jersey.

McKay served in the war for two years, winning the championship of Camp Fremont, Cal., and Camp Merritt. Of the latter place he was champion in all weights from welter up. He defeated the heavyweight cham-

**400 TO TAKE SUMMER COURSE AT U. OF O.**

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 21.—Four hundred students are expected at the sixteenth annual summer session of the University of Oregon which will be initiated in Eugene today, immediately following the graduation of the present senior class.

Dean H. D. Sheldon, in charge of the school, announces that an enlarged curriculum has been arranged, one offering 86 courses in 24 different departments. These include Americanization, Athletics, Art, Botany, Chemistry, Commerce, Dramatics, Economics, Education, English, French, Geology, Health and Hygiene, History, Library Science, Mathematics, Music, Physical Education, Physics, Psychology, Sociology, Social Welfare, Spanish and Zoology.

The faculty will embrace 38 members, 17 of whom will be specialists secured for the summer from the regular faculties of other institutions. The courses which will be given are planned primarily for teachers, both grade and high schools, school principals and superintendents, normal school and college professors, as well as students working toward Bachelor of Arts or advanced degrees.

**MISSIONARY TAKEN ILL**

The Rev. J. W. Hoyt, Sunday school missionary of the Presbyterian church in Oregon, was taken ill yesterday and is at present in the Warren Hunt hospital. Mr. Hoyt came to Klamath Falls the day before yesterday to assist in the Sunday school work, and had the misfortune to be taken ill the day he arrived. His condition is not serious and he should be around again in a few days.

PORTLAND, June 21.—The first State Conference of Public Health Nurses will be held in Portland July 1 and 2.
