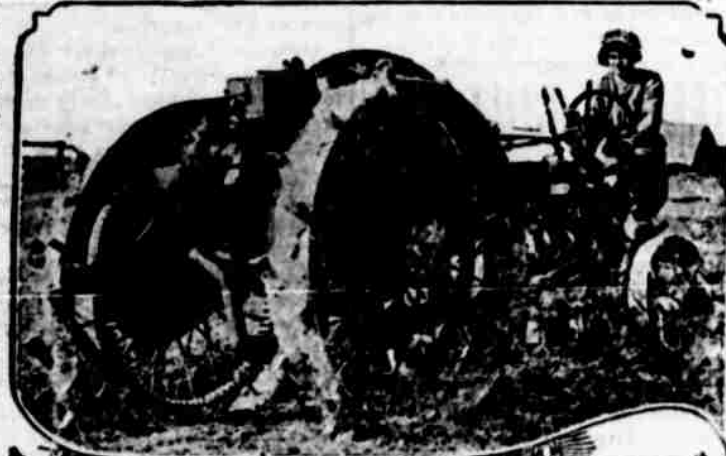

## Uncle Sam's Payroll

A year and a half after the armistice the War Department carries on its payroll 300,000 civilian employees!

The Navy Department still carries a civilian roll of 104,000, which exceeds the number of officers and men belonging to the American navy!

According to the latest estimate, the grand total of employees of the government is 759,870.

In Washington, the capital of the nation, 102,126 civilians are still drawing pay from Uncle Sam, as against 29,000 when war was declared in 1917.

And in the face of all this, with the departments so congested with employees that they are in each other's way, the postmaster general recently increased his force largely.

Even the Civil Service Commission is unable to furnish accurate figures touching the civil list and frankly admits it. Yet the country is told through official publicity channels of the government that the gigantic war machine, which is costing the taxpayers so dearly, is being reduced.

The department heads, instead of recognizing the need of curtailment and the putting on of brakes, without exception are submitting estimates which call for increased appropriations. But Congress—a Republican Congress—is pruning these estimates by the millions and forcing a reduction of the civilian roll by reducing the appropriations.

Representative Biegel, who presented a startling array of figures to the House, said:

"No official in a supervising capacity in any department has come forward with any real action showing that he has endeavored to reduce the force under him and to attain the high standard of efficiency the government should have at all times. Officials do not seem to realize that economy in government is imperative. Our burden of taxation is out of reason. Investigations show the urgent need of a real up-to-date budget system.

"While there are by far too many government employees the average employee is underpaid and many have lost their enthusiasm for government work. On the other hand there are many who render most efficient service on less than a living wage. The departments need new chiefs who will determine to keep those who are efficient and necessary and discharge without delay those who can be spared and who are inefficient.

"This will not come until there is a change in the administration."

## MONUMENT TO HERO OF INDIAN WAR UNVEILED

TOPPENISH, Wash., June 21.—A monument in memory of Captain A. J. Hembree, who fell when his scouting party was ambushed on the morning of April 10, 1856, by hostile Indians on a mountain side south of where the city of Toppenish now stands, was publicly unveiled in the city park here yesterday with appropriate exercises by the Washington State Historical society. A granite marker on the mountain side where the tragedy occurred was also dedicated in honor of the brave pioneer.

At the time Captain Hembree lost his life, Indian war was quite general in the northwest. The seat of trouble centered in the Yakima valley where lived Owlh, Kamabk and Quilchan, that subchief who had sworn to kill every white person who came within his range. Quilchan was probably the most blood-thirsty man of all this section of the country; many murders had already been committed by him and he had even killed some of his own people when they had remonstrated with him about his indiscriminate slaughter.

On January 26, 1856, Indians besieged the town of Seattle, the intent being to wipe out all American settlers; fortunately for the town and for the people living here, the sloop of war Decatur was in the harbor and shells thrown from her soon drove the Indians back.

The territory of Washington was

at that time but sparsely settled, a few regular soldiers were stationed at Forts Steilacoom, Vancouver and Walla Walla under the command of General Wool, whose headquarters were in San Francisco. Wool was strangely opposed to having his soldiers do anything to the Indians or to do anything that might be in line of co-operation with Governor Stephens; therefore the protection of life and property devolved mainly on volunteers.

To assist Washington and for her own protection, Oregon sent about 400 volunteers, commanded by Colonel Cornelius up the Columbia river through the Walla Walla district, on through the Palouse country back to the Columbia which stream they crossed at the mouth of the Yakima river and proceeded up Satus creek; coming to the mountains south of where the city of Toppenish is now located. Early on the morning of April 10, 1856, the colonel in command sent a scouting party of 10 men up the mountain side under the command of Capt. A. J. Hembree (one of the 900 immigrants who crossed the plains in 1843 and made the path which Lieutenant Fremont found); as the scout neared the top of the mountain, they were ambushed by Indians and Captain Hembree was killed.

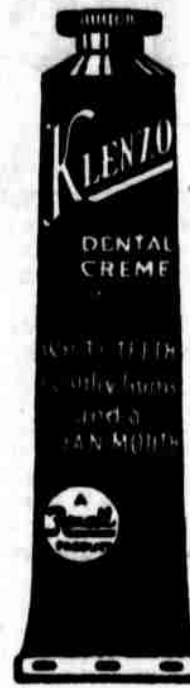
