AT THE THEATERS

TABLE PETITION OF BOXING FANS

A petition for the appointment of a new boxing commission was tabled by the city council last night.

Echoes of the war between the mayor and council over the boxing situation were awakened last night when the petition was presented.

At that time the council revoked the commissioner's appointment but the mayor refused to ratify the revocation. The statute regulating boxing apparently places the entire power of revocation with the mayor and the council was blocked.
