MARSHFIELD, June 24.—Marshfield finished its quota for the Oregon fund of \$100,000 for publicity during the next three years and received congratulations from many sources when it became known she was the first city in the state to report aving met the requirements. Being the home of the president of the state chamber of commerce, Charles Hall, the boosters thought it fitting to put the city over first as an incentive to other cities. PENDLETON, June 24.—A bite from a pet rattlesnake which had for years been a plaything caused the death of James Davis, 22, of Ukiah, Umatilla county.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 24.—The fossil of a prehistoric whale, relic of the miocene period, has been found on the Oregon coast near Newport by Dr. Earl L. Packard, professor of geology in the University of Oregon. This specimen, found on the cliffs, Dr. Packard believes, is the finest specimen of a fossil whale yet found in North America. Such petrified skeletons are rare, and the extreme age of the geologist's find makes it of particular interest to scientific men.

SALEM, June 24.—At the commencement exercises at Willamette University President Campbell, of the State University, stated that R. A. Booth, of Eugene, had made a gift of \$25,000 to be used as a student fund in all educational institutions of the state of Oregon.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 24.—Eighteen head of pure-bred Shorthorn and Hereford heifers have been purchased by L. E. McDaniels, newly appointed county agent of Harney county, to be distributed among calf club members of the county within a week or ten days. Most of the boys are purchasing their animals outright, but the banks of Harney county are financing those who need assistance.

Because of the excellent weather conditions the pigeons were expected to reach Oakland Saturday night and lower all previous records.

BAKER, June 24.—Baker's Fourth of July celebration committee met recently with representatives of the various lodges of the city and plans were formed for the prize parade and children's part in the big doings July 5.

PORTLAND, June 24.—Mrs. O. J. Bales, who died at the Sellwood hospital in Portland last Thursday was a resident of Oregon for over 50 years. She was born in Newton, Ia., but came west with her parents when but 3 years of age. Teyh first settled in Benton county and later moved to Marion county.

SALEM, June 24.—Mrs. Lena Schutz, wife of John Schutz, died at her home near Pratum. She was 42 years of age. Besides her husband Mrs. Schutz is survived by seven children.
