

SCHUYLEMAN IS
AFTER SEAT IN
S. F. CONVENTION

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—The national committee last night decided to seat R. R. Turner as delegate at large from Oregon. He had been named by the state committee to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the Hon. George T. Baldwin. John L. Schuyleman had protested against the seating of Turner. He appeared before the committee and argued that he should fill the vacancy on the ground that he received the fifth highest vote in the race for four places as delegate at large. Schuyleman announced he would carry his case to the credentials committee.

"They can't get away with the dirty trick they played on me," declared John L. Schuyleman as he left for the San Francisco convention to demand that the committee on credentials seat him as a delegate. "The man the state democratic committee of Oregon picked in place of me—R. R. Turner of Roseburg—represents only 13 individuals, while I was voted for by 10,439."

"The state committee, which met Saturday, represented only 14 out of 36 counties, and most of them were proxies, so that only about half a dozen counties were actually represented by their own committeemen. And yet the 13 individuals who selected Mr. Turner instead of me consider that they speak for the party. "I am charged with being registered as a socialist and for that I was refused the place made vacant as a delegate by the death of Senator G. T. Baldwin, although I was next high man. I was registered as a democrat in 1908 and 1910. In 1912 and 1916 I was registered as a socialist, but I did not vote in 1912, as I was traveling, and in 1916 I voted for Woodrow Wilson. I have voted three times for Bryan."

Rejects Proposal
"Before the committee turned me down a proposition was made to me. I was told that I would be selected as a delegate if I would promise to work for George E. Chamberlain and would consent to go as an ordinary delegate. Judge Crawford, I was told, was to be the chairman of the delegation and he would do the voting. If I would consent to this arrangement I would be selected, for otherwise, they told me, I would be a torpedo, and no torpedo was wanted. I rejected the proposition because I wanted to be a regular delegate, with a delegate's privilege of thinking and voting as he sees best."

"After my refusal the committee on nomination brought in a report providing that the alternates should be selected by the delegates, instead of having the state committee make the selection. They wanted to avoid establishing a precedent, for the proper thing to do would be to name as alternates the next highest candidates for delegates, and I was high man and, naturally, entitled to succeed the late Senator Baldwin. They tried to shut me out. It was dirty work, but they can't get away with it."

Schuyleman for Wilson
"The committee on credentials at the national convention will seat me, and when I am seated I will start voting for Woodrow Wilson for the nomination. I made my campaign for delegate on a platform for re-election of Woodrow Wilson. I will not vote for McAdoo and I will not consider myself bound by the vote for him in the democratic primaries, because Mr. McAdoo requested that his name be not placed on the primary ballot. I am taking McAdoo at his word, and I will vote and keep voting for Woodrow Wilson until he is nominated. And once Woodrow Wilson is nominated he will be elected."

MEDFORD AERIAL
BASE ARRANGED

MEDFORD, June 26.—Arrangements have been made by Captain Lowell H. Smith, commanding the squadron, for the establishment here for a base for the planes which will take part this summer in fire patrol work in southern Oregon and northern California.

The new county fairgrounds are being transformed into a first-class landing place. At this base will be constructed seven hangars. A wireless station will also be constructed. The base will be furnished with an automobile truck and automobile. A crew of 20 army men will be stationed here. While seven planes will have quarters here, only two will be in daily use. One will make a round trip daily patrol to Alturas, Cal., daily and the other will make a round trip daily patrol to Klamath Falls and vicinity.

The service will begin July 1. Captain Smith will make his headquarters at the Eugene base and Lieutenant Goldsborough at the Medford base.

WIT OF WIFE
SAVES HUSBAND

Saved from what might have been fatal consequences by the presence of mind of his wife, Lawrence Horton, Poe Valley rancher, is in the Warren Hunt hospital with a badly mangled hand as the result of getting it caught in a power saw at his ranch last evening.

Mr. Horton was finishing the day's sawing, when in some unaccountable fashion his gloved left hand came in contact with the teeth of the saw, and was drawn into the whirling blade.

His hand was gashed severely and had it not been for Mrs. Horton's quick action in improvising and applying a tourniquet to the arm he might have bled to death. After giving first aid Mrs. Horton got her husband in the family car and brought him to the hospital. Mr. Horton retained consciousness, despite pain and loss of blood, during the entire trip.

At the hospital it was found necessary to amputate the middle finger and Mr. Horton may lose the use of other fingers of the hand although surgeons hope to save them.

BOURBONS READY
FOR ROLL CALL

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—Completion of the temporary roll of the Democratic national convention was in sight today when the national committee resumed consideration of credentials with the Georgia contest before it, and Senator Reed's effort to gain a seat with the Missouri delegation also to be passed upon.

The influx of delegations which began yesterday continued and added hourly to the physical and conversational congestion in the hotel lobbies.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—The credentials committee of the Democratic national committee voted today to place the Palmer delegates from Georgia on the temporary roll of the national convention.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—Postmaster General Burleson, who arrived here during the night, declared he and the entire Texas delegation would vote for the nomination of McAdoo.

Pennsylvania "drys" won a smashing victory in the state convention caucus today, defeating all efforts to instruct the delegation for a "wet" plank by a vote of 60 against 13.

William J. Bryan was unanimously selected as Nebraska's representative on the resolutions committee at a caucus of the Nebraska delegates.

Secretary Meredith announced today that he was "not in any sense a candidate" for the Democratic nomination for president.

PT. KLAMATH TO CITY
FLIGHT IN 12 MINUTES

The Meyerhoffer airplane broke all records last night when it flew from Fort Klamath to this city in 12 minutes, a rate of 146 miles per hour, carrying, besides the pilot, I. G. Hunt, the mechanic, and Father Hugh Marshall. A high wind blowing between 40 and 50 miles an hour was with the plane. SAYS DANIELS
WARPED FACTS
DELIBERATELY

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The Sims-Daniels row over the navy's conduct in the war was revived today with the publication of a letter from Rear Admiral Benson C. Decker, commandant of the south naval district of Florida, in which he charges that Secretary Daniels, in his testimony before the senate investigation committee "intentionally and deliberately" misrepresented certain acts of Rear Admirals Sims, Fullam and Pike.

The letter dated June 7, and addressed to Chairman Hale of the committee, was published in the army and navy register service magazine. Admiral Decker said he also had sent a copy to Secretary Daniels.

The admiral declared in the letter that "from my personal knowledge of Mr. Daniels' character I am led to believe that whatever is cited in his statements to the discredit of the officers is so perverted and twisted as to give the actual facts false meaning."

300 WOMEN ARE
DELEGATES TO
S. F. CONVENTION

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—Mrs. William H. England of Oklahoma, Vassar graduate and mother of six children, is one of more than 300 women who are delegates to the democratic national convention which opens here June 28. Her husband was a delegate to the republican national convention at Chicago this month.

Among the other Oklahoma delegates are two women who trace their ancestry to Indian chieftains. They are Mrs. Richard L. Fite, wife of a physician, formerly of Georgia, and grand niece of Sequoyah, inventor of the Cherokee alphabet; and Mrs. Eugene B. Lawson, wife of an attorney and oil man and daughter of the Rev. Charles Johnnycake, last chief of the Delaware. Mrs. Fite was first chairman of the Women's democratic club of Oklahoma. Mrs. Lawson was formerly president of the Oklahoma Federation of Women's clubs and both were prominent in war work.

Miss Laura Clay, delegate at large from Kentucky, was one of the organizers of the Kentucky Equal Rights Association in 1888 and is reputed to be a "practical farmer."

Mrs. Elizabeth Marbury, delegate at large from New York, who was decorated by the United States, France, Belgium and Italy for war work, is first vice president of the League of Catholic Women. She came to the convention with Mrs. John Sherwin Crosby, "mother of New York women democrats," in a special train from New York that carried 54 women delegates and alternates.

Texas sent a nationally known figure in Mrs. Percy Pennypacker, club leader. One of the best known of California's eight delegates is Miss Mary E. Foy, who has been identified with many phases of civic betterment work. Mrs. John W. Troy of Alaska was the first woman delegate to arrive here.

Seventeen women, headed by Mrs. Josephus Daniels, wife of the secretary of the navy, have been appointed by Homer S. Cummings, chairman of the democratic national committee, as members of the executive committee of 34.

Mrs. George Bass, first chairman of the Women's Bureau of the democratic national committee, and Mrs. Mary Holland Kinkaid, assistant director of publicity, are among the leaders here. Mrs. Bass is a Chicago civic worker and had charge of the 1916 democratic presidential campaign in 12 western equal suffrage states, 10 of which cast their electoral vote for Wilson.
