OREGON BREVITIES

GOLD HILL, June 24.—Fabrick & Welch of Medford have purchased the sawmill equipment of Rhodes & Cotteral at Beagle in the Gold Hill district and are removing it to Phoenix, where they operate on timber from Rogue river and the Siskiyou mountains south of Ashland.

EUGENE, June 24.—Colin Dymont, for the last year acting secretary of the extension division of the State university in Portland, was selected as dean of the college of literature and arts to succeed Dean Straub of the board of regents Monday.

SALEM, June 24.—Robert Zullig, who shot and killed his wife in Lake county on October 11, 1918, must serve an indeterminate term of from 7 1/2 to 15 years in the state penitentiary, according to an opinion written by Justice Bennett, and handed down by the Oregon supreme court here. The opinion affirms the decree of Judge L. C. Conn of the Lake county circuit court.

NEWBERG, June 24.—A big celebration is planned July 5 at Newberg. The American Legion is behind it. The parade starts at 10 o'clock headed by the Multnomah Guard band of Portland and the American Legion Newberg band. Sports of all kinds will be the order of the afternoon. The day will close with a street dance.

OREGON CITY, June 24.—Henry Ruhl, whose home is near George, about six miles from Estacada, committed suicide by hanging himself. Word was sent to Oregon City by Chris Johnson, a resident of that section, asking for the coroner.

HOOD RIVER, June 24.—L. C. Heizer, half-brother of Billy Sunday, has gone to Austin, where he will join Sam Kershaw, veteran miner, who has just struck one of the richest veins of gold it is said recently found in eastern Oregon. Mr. Kershaw has a local homestead ranch. Mr. Heizer spent last summer prospecting with the veteran miner.

EUGENE, June 24.—E. R. Bryson, school director of Eugene, was recalled at the annual school election and Dr. P. J. Bartle was elected in his place by a vote of 1,162 to 732. The entire ticket headed by Dr. Bartle was elected, the other new members of the board being Charles M. Emery and Hollis W. Libby.

MEDFORD, June 24.—With the wool market broken, the mutton market on the decline and labor and commodities at the highest peak, the sheep men of Jackson county, realizing that their industry is in a critical condition, have formed a temporary organization of sheep and goat men with Fred Harron of Ashland temporary president and C. ISLAND GARRISONS WILL STAGE BOXING

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Authority has been given by the War Department for the holding of a military boxing tournament in the Philippine Department, July 1 to 5. The soldier-pugilists will be divided into seven classes by weight, one enlisted man being selected from each military post in every class. Elimination contests will begin soon at the posts to determine the best available candidate.

Athletic directors of the tournament have fixed the following weight limits: 115 pounds and under, Bantam weight, 125 pounds and under, Featherweight, 135 pounds and under, Lightweight, 145 pounds and under, Welterweight, 158 pounds and under, Middleweight, 175 pounds and under, Light Heavy.
