NEED BETTER PAID TEACHERS

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, July 2.—Increased compensation and increased service are needed to solve a national educational emergency now existing. Mrs. Josephine Corlies Preston, president of the National Education association, and state superintendent of the Washington schools, told students and faculty of the summer session and Corvallis people in an address at the college Tuesday afternoon. Her subject was "Emergency in Education."

"Greater service and greater responsibility for each teacher in America are needed. Said Mrs. Preston. Teachers with increased pay will be willing to give more efficient service. The teacher has civic responsibility outside of the classroom."

Betterment of rural schools, the rural community problem, public health, adult illiteracy, training for civic life, thrift education, Americanization, and immigration and industrial education are subjects of outstanding importance with which the teaching profession must deal, brought out the speaker.

EXPLORER SAYS GEOGRAPHY OF NORTH IS WRONG

WINNIPEG, Man., July 2.—"It is deplorable and ridiculous what the schools of Canada teach Canadian children about the northlands of the dominion," declared Vilhjalmur Stefansson, a recent visitor here. "It amounts to most defamatory propaganda," added the noted explorer. People generally display a lamentable ignorance concerning this country, and it is simply due to the fact that they are wrongly instructed when they are children, according to Mr. Stefansson, who declared that the country north of the Arctic circle is very different to what people believe.

There are 640 different species of flowering plants, and roughly three times as many species of flowering plants as non-flowering plants in the Arctic country, Mr. Stefansson said, and he described some of the conditions responsible for what to the people of Canada, seems anomalous, because of the climatic conditions there.

In the north, he explained, there are two seasons similar to the seasons of the settled part of Canada.

Just in the same way as grass cannot grow here in the winter time the grass cannot grow in the country around the north of the Arctic circle in the winter. But in the summer time, one can find up there golden rod, poppies, dandelions, timothy and watercress "and these plants grow as far north as any land that has been discovered," added Mr. Stefansson.

Speaking of the development of the northland, Mr. Stefansson predicted that it would be developed in the same way as other countries. He explained that there are rich resources up there, and when measured by its productivity and not by its climate, and if a land is productive it will be developed irrespective of its climate.

CAL HOG RAISERS FORCED TO QUIT

SACRAMENTO, July 2.—"Some one other than the farmer is getting a good share of profit out of the consumer's dollar," remarked S. B. Bennett, Field Secretary of the Western American Berkshire Congress, who returned to his headquarters in Sacramento today after a tour of California.

"I find that the farmer is forced to sell hogs so cheaply now that many of them are going out of the hog business. They are disgusted at the low price packers and butchers pay them for their hogs which have been finished on high priced feeds.

"Hogs are being sold by the farmer to the butcher at far below what they were bringing a year ago at this time, and yet, I don't know that anyone has noticed a corresponding reduction in the retail price of pork. Hogs that a year ago brought the farmer from 19 to 20 cents a pound are now being sold to butchers and packers at 14 1/2 to 15 1/2 cents a pound.

"If this condition continues, there will be a scarcity of pork in another year, for the farmers are selling their sows and are quitting the business."
