OREGON BREVITIES

BEND, July 2.—At the end of a three weeks' illness, Mrs. Carolyn Moss, for the past three years a resident of Bend, died shortly after 6 o'clock Tuesday morning at Mountain View hospital, of pleural pneumonia, aged 81 years.

PORTLAND, July 2.—Foreed to make a sudden landing, an airplane of the O. K. Jeffrey company, piloted by Captain McClurg, was completely wrecked shortly after noon Sunday near the Westmoreland aviation field.

SALEM, July 2.—Judge G. G. Bingham's department of the circuit court was thrown into turmoil Monday when Barton E. Davies, Salem umpire, who was suing his wife to recover approximately \$1,500 alleged to be due on a promissory note, tore the purported signature of Mrs. Davies from the document and swallowed it in the presence of officers and witnesses.

PORTLAND, July 2.—James Yliraak, 40, a laborer employed by the Warren Construction company, was instantly crushed to death about noon Monday, when several tons of crushed rock fell upon him from a stone crusher being operated for the Craig road construction work near Rocky Butte.

PORTLAND, July 2.—One of Oregon's best known pioneer women was Mrs. Phoebe M. Dekum, who died at Los Angeles on Saturday night at the age of 80 years, following paralysis. Funeral services were held at Los Angeles Monday, according to word to members of the family here, and the body was cremated. The ashes will be sent to The Dalles for burial.

DALLAS, July 2.—Alfred Stimpson, aged 59, a widower, died at the Dallas hospital Saturday night from injuries received when he fell against a woodsaw, with which he was working at Monmouth Saturday morning. The man was nearly cut in two at the waist.

HOOD RIVER, July 2.—Council Oliver, one of the negroes held, charged with the murder of Brake-man Otis Mayes, was brought here from The Dallas Monday morning, following a confession that he had concealed a loaded revolver in the mattress in his cell while held here following his arrest. His story proved to be true. Local officers are wondering how he hid the gun while undergoing a close search.

Japanese labor in Hawaii has been instructed from Japan not to work for white planters. The Japanese strikers have destroyed many valuable sugar cane plantations.

ROOSEVELT RESIGNS FROM MARINE CORPS

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 2.—Lieut. Col. Henry Latrobe Roosevelt resigned his commission in the marine corps today to accept an important executive position with an oil concern in the Oklahoma field. Colonel Roosevelt is a cousin of the former President Theodore Roosevelt and also of Assistant Secretary Franklin D. Roosevelt of the navy department. Like his distinguished kinsman he was known to the marine corps as Teddy. He entered the corps in December, 1899, after having served as a naval cadet at sea in the Spanish-American war, and was in charge of the construction of the cantonment at Quantico, Va., in the world war, and served there as post quartermaster. His service in the corps comprised duty in the Philippines, Panama, Cuba and Haiti. In August, 1914, he was ordered to France and attached to the American embassy in connection with the relief of American citizens who were caught in the web of the war's sudden outbreak.
