SALEM, July 3.—S. P. Pierce and R. E. L. Bedillion of Coos Bay and Joseph N. Scott and J. Roy Raley of Pendleton and C. E. Woodson of Hephner will appear in Salem tomorrow to draw lots for the democratic nominations for representative in the 22d and in the sixth representative districts.

The three each received one vote for representative in the 22d district, comprising Umatilla and Morrow counties. Mr. Woodson is the regular republican nominee.
