Such conception can only be gained through actual contact with life problems and actual participation in affairs of government.

Politics is the science of government. It is also that part of ethics which has to do with the regulation and government of nations or state. It is the preservation of its safety, peace and prosperity, the defense of its existence and rights against foreign control or conquest. It is the protection of its citizens in their rights.

Some one has wisely said that "Every citizen is in politics. The Constitution of the United States puts him there and his conscience grants him no exemptions."

We who have been working with political parties which have to do with the selection of men to conduct our nation's affairs, as well as to shape through platforms, definite principles and policies, know how necessary it is that our men and women in education shall keep abreast of the tide of all public issues—all vital to our homes, our schools, our communities. The school cannot rise far beyond its community.

The educators of this nation are in a strategic position. They have a two-fold responsibility—an educational responsibility to our children, a civic responsibility to our community, state and national life.

Let us be statesmen here in this meeting. Let us continue to build for the welfare of the greatest number.

PENALTY ON WEALTH IN SIBERIAN MINES

SEATTLE, July 6.—An American miner stands no chance of getting rich by working placer claims in northeastern Siberia, according to Thomas Tenneson, who is in Seattle on his first trip out of Alaska in 16 years, for the purpose of buying supplies. Any show of wealth will destroy his chances of success. If he comes to the placer fields with a few pans and a poor mouth, the Siberians will help him along and direct him to the rich grounds. But let him hire a few helpers and he becomes a capitalist in the eyes of the Russian. So long as he does not acquire too much wealth he is not molested.

At least 500 men have crossed from northwest Alaska peninsula to Siberia, most of them making the journey in open rowboats, Mr. Tenneson reported. The trip from the Alaskan to the Asian side takes about 24 hours in a rowboat, he said.

HARDSHIPS TOLD BY TROOPS FROM SIBERIAN FIELD

HONOLULU, T. H., June 28. (By Mail.)—Four years without having tasted a bite of meat or a drop of tea, and six years of almost continuous fighting in bleak Siberia on a wage of one dollar a month are two features of the tales of deprivation told by Czech-Slovak privates recently here en route home via Panama aboard the United States transport Edellyn.

Many of the twenty-two hundred men aboard the transport came from the humbler walks of life, but a number of them, officers and privates, had been college professors, students of higher mathematics, musicians, etc.

One of a party of three Czech-Slovaks, who were guests of a Honolulu business man at dinner, wore the uniform of a private and the manners of a courtier. He said he had been a professor of music, languages and history in Bohemia prior to the outbreak of the war he had been a political prisoner in the Hungarian mines. Then he was drafted into an Austro-Hungarian regiment and sent to the East front. Like thousands of others of his countrymen, he became a willing prisoner of the Russians, fought in the czar's forces until Russia collapsed, and then joined one of the Czech bands, which ultimately became the Czech-Slovak army of Siberia and fought its way from Southern European Russia to the Eastern boundaries of Siberia.

A second member of the trio had been a student in the University of Vienna when the great war came.

"I do not know if my father and brothers are still alive," he said. "I have not heard from them for six years. I was eighteen when the war broke out."

Those aboard the Edellyn said that when they left Vladivostok there were about 15,000 Czechs in Siberia awaiting repatriation, out of a force of 75,000 when the repatriation movement began. Most of these have gone home via the Suez canal. One ship, the Edellyn traveled via Honolulu and Panama, the Mount Vernon went via San Francisco and Panama and two ships went to Vancouver, B. C., their human cargoes crossing the continent on a Canadian railroad.

The men are: Major Pease of Abascoke, Tom LaForge of Wyola, Al Morrison of Prior, eBrnard Provo, known as Barney Bravo, George Deputee of Lodge Grass and J. W. Cooper of near Billings. All of these men have inter-married with the Crows and have grandchildren who are members of the tribe.

The dean of these men is Major Pease, who in early days was an army scout and led the expedition of General Harney. Later he became the first Crow Indian agent. Tom LaForge, one of the most picturesque white men in eastern Montana, was one of the soldiers sent against the Sioux at the time of the Custer massacre, although not with Custer himself. Provo is a veteran of the Civil war and of numerous Indian wars as well. He is of German descent, Morrison also is a Civil war veteran, while Cooper has served as an army scout. Deputee has been an Indian trader and clerk for 35 years.

Several years ago two white women who had taught in the government school at Crow Agency and had married educated Indians of the Crow tribe, were admitted to the tribe. A negro, long in government employ, also has been adopted by the Indians.

CROWS ADOPT WHITE BROTHERS

RED LODGE, Mont., July 6.—Six white men, well-known characters who have had a share in the life of the Crow Indians of this section, have been selected by the Indians for adoption into the tribe. The selections were made at a recent meeting of the tribal council, and the names of the men chosen will be sent to the commissioner of Indian affairs at Washington, D. C. If he approves, formal adoption of the white men will take place.

The men are: Major Pease of Abascoke, Tom LaForge of Wyola, Al Morrison of Prior, eBrnard Provo, known as Barney Bravo, George Deputee of Lodge Grass and J. W. Cooper of near Billings. All of these men have inter-married with the Crows and have grandchildren who are members of the tribe.
