AT THE THEATERS

"Human Stuff," the newest Uni-
versal production starring Harry
Carey, and said to differ in many
respects from the photodramas in
which the star has appeared of late,
is to be seen at the Liberty Theatre
tonight.

What makes "Human Stuff" some-
what different is the fact that its
early scenes are laid in the conven-
tional East and shows the star in
an environment foreign to his ac-
customed stage characterizations.
He is seen as the son of a wealthy
manufacturer who, after trying his
hand at running the business, is
forced to admit himself a failure.
He decides to seek adventure and
fortune in the West, where his father
owns a ranch.

Mistaken for a tenderfoot who has
come to interfere with their nefari-
ous plans, his neighbors conspire to
drive Jim from the ranch, but here
he is in his element and enjoys the
struggle against nature and the
rough men who are opposed to him.
Then a girl enters into his life and
the fight becomes more exciting.
Situations follow in rapid succession,
and the story ends in a typical Carey
climax.

Harry Carey shows a new angle of
his skill in the portrayal of the two
phases of Jim Pierce—the eastern
business man and the western sheep
rancher. His support includes Mary
Charleson, Ruth Fuller Golden, Fon-
taine La Rue, Charles Le Moine,
Rudolph Christians, Joe Harris and
others. The direction is due to
Reeves Eason.

In "The Sagebrusher," the photo-
play of the famous Emerson Hough
"best seller," Benjamin B. Hampton,
the new genius of motion picture
production, has added another to his
long list of technical triumphs. One
incident in the powerful W. W. Hod-
kinson release shows a mighty dam
across a mountain canyon blown up,
flooding the canyon and washing
away a whole settlement below it.
This was a straight feat of engineer-
ing and motion picture generalship.

A forest fire, is another thrilling
element of the story. While the fire
that raged in the Sierra Madres dur-
ing the month of September, one of
the most destructive conflagrations
ever recorded in the range, was used
in most of the forest fire scenes of
the play, an artificial forest had to be
built for one scene that in the picture
last but a few seconds—a mere flash.

In the huge scope of this technical
work, and down to the smallest de-
tails of perfection in costume, setting,
lighting and photography, "The
Sagebrusher" is a step ahead of its
day. It was filmed in California and
Montana, with a cast of star players,
including Roy Stewart, Noah Beery,
Marguerite e La Motte, Betty Brice,
and Arthur Morrison in the principal
roles.

Edward Sloman, a celebrated
dramatic artist and director of both
the speaking and the shadow stage,
directed "The Sagebrusher." Credit
for the beautiful photography be-
longs to John Seitz and his sub-cam-
era artist, Clark Bond. And Em-
erson Hough, the famous author, per-
sonally co-operated in the production
of his novel, "The Sagebrusher."
Benj. B. Hampton's second Great
Authors production, comes to the
Liberty Theatre Saturday only.

The story of "The Mollycoddle"
which will be the feature production
at the Liberty Theatre on Sunday
and which is the third production
Douglas Fairbanks has made for
the United Artists Corporation, was

TON STREET FROM 1ST STREET
TO 3RD STREET.

The Common Council of the City of
Klamath Falls, Oregon, having ascer-
tained and determined the propor-
tionate share for which each lot, part
of lot, block and acreage property
shall be liable for the cost of making
the proposed improvement of Wash-
ington Street from 1st Street to 3rd
Street, including intersections; and
having on the 6th day of July, 1939,
filed in the office of the Police Judge
of said city a statement thereof,
which said statement is known and
designated as the PROPOSED AS-
SESSMENT roll for such improve-
ment.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that
said Common Council did by resolu-
tion fix Monday, the 19th day of July,
1939, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m.
at the Council Chamber in the City
Hall of said city—said date being a
date upon which a regular meeting of
said council will be held—as the
time and place for hearing and deter-
mining all objections that may be
made to such assessment, and that
thereafter, having heard and deter-
mined such objections, if any there
should be, said Common Council will
proceed to assess the proportionate
share and part of the cost of making
said proposed improvement in ac-
cordance with the benefit accruing to
each lot, part of lot, block and acreage
property and by ordinance de-
clare such proportionate shares to be
specific liens against the respective

lots, parts of lots, blocks and acreage
properties so found and determined to
be liable.
The owner or owners of property
so found liable for such proportionate
cost of such improvement are hereby
referred to such assessment roll on
file with the Police Judge for detailed
information as to such assessment.
The boundaries within which the
property lies that has been deter-
mined to be benefited and to be as-

essed as aforesaid, is all that prop-
erty lying adjacent to the said street
as far as the improvement extends
thereon and extending back from the
side lines of said street to the center
of the respective blocks so lying ad-
jacent.
