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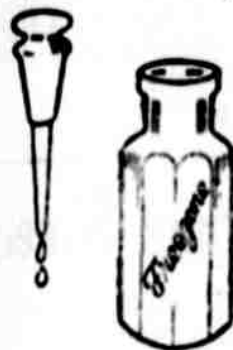

The Common Council of the City of
Klamath Falls, Oregon, having as-
certained and determined the propo-
sition and determined the propo-
portionate share for which each lot, part
of lot, block and acreage property
shall be liable for the cost of making
the proposed improvement of Klamath
Avenue from 9th Street to 11th
Street, including intersections; and
having on the 6th day of July, 1929,
filed in the office of the Police Judge
of said city a statement thereof,
which said statement is known and
designated as the "PROPOSED AS-
SESSMENT" roll for such improve-
ment.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that
said Common Council did by resolu-
tion fix Monday, the 15th day of July,
1929, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m.
at the Council Chamber in the City
Hall of said city—said date being a
date upon which a regular meeting of
said council will be held—as the time
and place for hearing and determin-
ing all objections that may be made
to such assessment, and that there-
after, having heard and determined
such objections, if any there should
be, said Common Council will proceed
to assess the proportionate share and
part of the cost of making said pro-
posed improvement in accordance
with the benefit accruing to each lot,
part of lot, block and acreage prop-
erty and by ordinance declare such
proportionate shares to be specific

liens against the respective lots, parts
of lots, blocks and acreage properties
so found and determined to be liable.

The owner or owners of property
so found liable for such proportionate
cost of such improvement are hereby
referred to such assessment roll on
file with the Police Judge for de-
tailed information as to such assess-
ment.

The boundaries within which the
property lies that has been deter-
mined to be benefited and to be as-

side lines of said street to the center

WEAR BELLS ON THEIR TOES

Men of Dakar, French West Africa,
Also Carry Surprising Assortment
of Other Trinkets.

Men of Dakar, the seat of French
West African administration, literally
wear rings on their fingers and bells
on their toes, not to mention amulets,
beads, coins and a surprising assort-
ment of trinkets, mostly regarded as
charms. The natives, however, are
not to be regarded as savage, except in
their ability to fight.

Of the West African tribes, the Ber-
bers are believed by some experts to
have been at one time masters of the
Mediterranean. They have many times
been conquered and driven out of
their homelands, but always main-
tain their racial identity, their physi-
cal characteristics and a persistent
love of freedom.

The Berber women have fought by
their husbands' sides, and their moral-
ity is of a high character. In Dakar
can also be seen the Serers, a tribe
of natives that worship the snake and
believe in the transmigration of souls.
A height of six feet and six inches
is not uncommon among the men of
the Serers.

Among the most intelligent of the
natives are the Fula, whose folk
tales betray lofty ideals and poetic
imaginary that is comparable with
early Greek and Norse lore. Their
horsemanship is famous, and their
cavalry is noted for daring and valor.
The intelligence of their women and
the respect accorded them is attested
by the proverb: "Let a female slave
enter a household and she soon be-
comes mistress."

Eagle as an Emblem.

They are two different species of
eagle. The American eagle is the
white-headed or bald eagle, while the
German is known as the imperial
eagle, probably, identically original
with the golden eagle of Europe. Our
American eagle first appeared as an
emblem on the great seal of the United
States, adopted June 20, 1782; its de-
sign was a shield on the breast of an
American bald eagle. The device is
stated to have been largely suggested
to John Adams when minister to Great
Britain by Sir John Preston, Eng-
lish antiquary. The eagle was first
used on United States coins in 1788.
The Persians, Egyptians, Romans,
French under Napoleon, Austrians,
Russians and Prussians have all used
on their standards the imperial eagle,
emblem of power; the double-headed
eagle of Austria and of Russia signi-
fied power east and west. The Ger-
man eagle is the single-headed black
eagle, with red claws and tongue and
the crown of Charlemagne over the
head.
