WILL ENLARGE HARBOR

YOKOHAMA, Japan, June 15. (By Mail.)—The harbor of Yokohama will be enlarged and improved to meet the growing demands of foreign trade. The equivalent of seven million dollars will be expended during five years. The port for foreign trade will be enlarged to dock vessels of 50,000 tons directly at the wharf and special railways will be laid to connect the port with the entrance of the town.

It is said that his greatest ambition is to retire from active life to the fields of Normandy where he can rusticate among the ruined churches of France.

KHIVA BECOMES A REPUBLIC

Famous Khazis of Central Asia Has Definitely Rejected the Chains of Despotism.

So Khiva, the khanate in Central Asia through which Col. Fred Burnaby once rode on horseback to the capital, has declared itself an independent republic! That prodigious English soldier and traveler who won military glory fighting outside the endangered square at Abu Klea, in the Sudan, would smile hugely, no doubt, were he able to read the news. For the semi-barbaric city of Khiva as he found it on that famous ride in the seventies, or rather as the Russians found it just two or three years before, to be exact, was filled with slaves captured from the Persians by Turkoman raiders. Its whitewashed houses, scattered amid the elms and poplars, produced a welcome effect, however, after the countless miles of arid steppes which had to be negotiated before it could be reached. Its citizens were those weirdly named "cousins" of the Turks, the Uzbeqs, Kirghiz, Sarts, Tajaks and the Kara-Kalpaks, or Black Bonnets of the Turki tribe whom the caliph would fain gather into the family fold. The khanate is but the relic of the once great kingdom of Chorasnia, over which King Darius ruled by means of his satraps.—Christian Science Monitor.

PLAN SCHOOL ON SHIPBOARD

Socialistic Council of Bradford, England, is Considering the Adoption of Remarkable Scheme.

When it became necessary to erect a new secondary school in Bradford, the rich wool textile center of England, the usual estimates were asked for, and reported, in the total sum of \$200,000.

Socialists, who have a considerable majority on the Bradford education committee, at once decided to break free from tradition, and adopted the idea of buying a suitable seagoing ship for that amount, one big enough for a couple of hundred children. These children will be sent to sea for a six-months or 12-months period, if a subsequent suggestion is adopted.

It is still to be settled whether the ship schoolhouse will remain moored in Bradford canal docks, only going to sea as a freighter during vacation periods, or whether it would not be in the interests of a general education to let the scholars see glimpses of foreign ports, learning their languages among natives, the ship at the same time being loaded with cargoes that would pay full maintenance expenses, probably even of the boarding of the children.

NOTICE OF FILING OF PROPOSED ASSESSMENT ROLL FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF KLAMATH AVENUE FROM 9TH STREET TO 11TH STREET.

The Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, having ascertained and determined the proportionate share for which each lot, part of lot, block and acreage property shall be liable for the cost of making the proposed improvement of Klamath Avenue from 9th Street to 11th Street, including intersections; and having on the 6th day of July, 1930, filed in the office of the Police Judge of said city a statement thereof, which said statement is known and designated as the "PROPOSED ASSESSMENT" roll for such improvement.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that said Common Council did by resolution fix Monday, the 19th day of July, 1930, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. at the Council Chamber in the City Hall of said city—a regular meeting of said council will be held—as the time and place for hearing and determining all objections that may be made to such assessment, and that thereafter, having heard and determined such objections, if any there should be, said Common Council will proceed to assess the proportionate share and part of the cost of making said proposed improvement in accordance with the benefit accruing to each lot, part of lot, block and acreage property and by ordinance declare such proportionate shares to be specific liens against the respective lots, parts of lots, blocks and acreage properties so found and determined to be liable. The owner or owners of property so found liable for such proportionate cost of such improvement are hereby referred to such assessment roll on file with the Police Judge for detailed information as to such assessment.

The boundaries within which the property lies that has been determined to be benefited and to be assessed as aforesaid, is all that property lying adjacent to the said street as far as the improvement extends thereon and extending back from the side lines of said street to the center of the respective blocks so lying adjacent.

CARPET BAGGERS RULE RUMANIA

BUCHAREST, June 14. (By Mail.)—That the carpet bagging system known to the South after the Civil War has been applied by the Rumanians in their new provinces of Bessarabia, Bukovina and Transylvania is the burden of complaints that the vines are sending to the allied governments. It is charged that these provinces have been loaded up with dishonest civilian officials, who work in connection with the armies of occupation to bulldoze and terrorize the local inhabitants. It is even charged that the wealthier landowners are being arrested in the hope that they will either desert their lands and sell their homes far under the real value.

According to Dr. Nicholas Lupu, recently Minister of the Interior, the army of occupation in these provinces should long since have been removed. "After four years of war soldiers respect the rights of nobody," he said.

In Bessarabia, where the army is kept as a protection against the Bolsheviks, the charges of mal-administration have been many. It is stated that here the army has also prevented the just operation of the law providing for the division of the land.

The gravest charges come from Transylvania and the Hungarian frontier, where the nationality bitterness has long been deep. On those members of the Hungarian nobility who have persisted in remaining on their estates are quartered a half a dozen soldiers or policemen who practically hold them prisoners. While they are able to operate their estates, they are not permitted to receive visitors or mail except by permission of these soldiers. Many instances are cited where the head of the house has been arrested and so harassed that he had to flee, leaving his home in the possession of his wife and daughter, much after the manner of the Russian and Polish landholders during the early stages of Bolshevism.

There are many cases cited where thoroughbred horses have been stolen and later entered into the races in the different cities of Rumania.

There have been numerous reports that the Transylvania hope to find a way out of their difficulties by converting themselves into a small republic, if later circumstances permit, or else of again joining themselves to the Hungarians.

It is charged that the land is being taken from the rightful owners and divided up among the Rumanian carpet baggers, who in turn sell it to the Rumanian peasants of the country.

BALANCE SHEET IS DRAWN FOR GERMANY

PARIS, June 31. (By Mail.)—A reparations balance sheet has been drawn up by the French Minister of Finance. It is intended to show at a glance on any date the condition of the account between France and Germany. On the debit side will appear all expenditures made by the French government which, under the treaty of Versailles, are chargeable to Germany. This will include sums paid

for reconstruction for war damages and for pensions.

The billions already paid out for these objects make the sheet list heavily to the debit side; the credit column reserved for payments by Germany is still blank.
