AT THE THEATERS

Thrilling scenes in fast moving biplanes 5,000 feet above the earth with Lieutenant O. L. Locklear performing his spectacular feat of changing from one moving plane to another in mid-air; a story of wonderful romance and strange adventure; special aeroplane settings that give one a glimpse of what may be reality a few years hence; marvelous night scenes showing squadrons of U. S. Mail service aeroplanes leaving their hangars at midnight, illuminated by searchlights and other unusual scenes are promised in "The Great Air Robbery," the much heralded Universal de luxe feature, which will be seen at the Liberty Theatre tonight.

"The Great Air Robbery" marks a new epoch in photoplay achievement. The star of the production is the only man accomplishing the hair-raising feat of changing planes a mile above the ground. Surrounding the exploits of this intrepid aviator is a story written and directed by Jacques Jaccard which carries a thrill in every hundred feet of film, and enacted by a company of screen favorites, such as Francella Billington, Allan Forest, Ray Ripley, Carmen Phillips and others.

Three months were spent in making this feature, and fully a half hundred speedy biplanes were utilized in the production. A squad of daring cameramen mounted on speedy air-cruisers, and directed by wireless from the Universal aviation field, were employed in making the scenes above the clouds. All pre-release reports indicate that the money and ingenuity expended on the production were well merited.

CHILEAN NITRATE MOSTLY MARKETED

SANTIAGO, Chile, June 13. (By Mail).—The critical situation created to the main industry of Chile has been considerably bettered this year and the Nitrate Producers' association has exported already 95,000 tons of nitrate against a production of only 55,000 tons, which means that most of the surplus that could not be placed last year has found an easy market. The price of nitrate of soda has also increased considerably.

The prosperity of this industry means for Chile solid financial situation of the government; abundance of work for laborers and general welfare of the country. The reverse was experienced last year when there was no market for nitrate.

BANDITS ANNOY CHINESE FIRMS

CHENGTU, China, June 1. (By Mail).—Depredations of robber bands along trade routes in Szechuen province have become so flagrant and widespread that urgent appeals for the use of troops to combat the menace have been sent to the Chinese provincial authorities by foreign firms operating in Szechuen. The bands of robbers are said to be made up to a large extent of groups of deserters from troops that have been stationed in Szechuen. The outlaws have become so bold that mail consignments, hitherto immune from them, have been seized.

One recent report that was brought to Chengtu was of the robbery of a pack train on the "big road," which is the main highway between Chungking and Chengtu. In this 40 bags of mail were opened and rifled by the outlaws and "the whole hillside was covered with stolen mail."

In another case a caravan had been held up and robbed by a band of bandits when a second stronger band of brigands appeared and compelled the return of the stolen goods. The leader of the smaller band was then shot. The chieftain who did this declared that he had guaranteed the safe passage of this particular caravan, having received a substantial consideration.

The activities of the bandits are felt as much by the individual as by the large commercial interests in the opinion of one Chengtu mission worker who said:

"It is a grievous hardship to send to America for a suit of clothes, pay for it at the present ruinous prices, wait patiently six months for its arrival and finally hear that it has been appropriated by robbers within a few days of its destination."

PRINCE ALBERT HAS GOOD QUALITIES

LONDON, June 19. (By Mail).—Prince Albert, who has become Duke of York, Baron Kilmorney and Earl of Inverness, as second son of the King, who possessed the titles as King Edward's second son, is known as "The Industrial Prince" because of his keen interest in economic questions, his belief that it is no member of "the idle rich but a genuine worker," and the popularity he has won with wage-earners with whom he frequently and comfortably converses.

The prince is described as "a typical, amiable, likeable, practical Englishman, who has no brilliancy but knows the job of being prince is no sinecure." His passion is for lawn tennis and squash rackets and his indoor amusement is dancing. Recently he was created a wing-commander in the Royal Air Force, in which he won his wings as a pilot.

Prince Albert makes no pretense to oratory "but always says something to the point—and his speeches are not written for him."

GOLD SMUGGLERS PLY ACTIVE TRADE

RANGOON, June 8. (By Mail).—Several important seizures of British and American gold have recently been made here. The money was found secreted on ships and included amounts of \$42,000, \$23,000 and \$27,000.

The business of smuggling has some time but it is believed that the authorities have at last got the upper hand.

In this latest seizure the officials had to call in divers before their search of a vessel could be completed.

A big water tank was discovered on the side of which was a number of shelves with 16 bags of gold on them. The bags were brought to the surface and were found to contain 13,587 Queen Victoria sovereigns and 6,023 American eagles.
