EUGENE, July 17.—Fire that started at 1:30 o'clock Monday afternoon completely ruined the large drygoods store of F. E. Dunn, pioneer merchant of this city. The two-story brick building which the store occupied was also badly damaged and probably will have to be rebuilt.

EUGENE, July 17.—Simon H. Hoffman, 56 years old, a pioneer of the Siuslaw valley, died at Willamette hospital in Eugene Sunday afternoon. He lived at Point Terrace, where he settled many years ago.

ROSEBURG, July 17.—Jean Ward, the 22-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Ward, sustained a painful and severe accident Saturday night when she was thrown into the windshield of the car driven by her father, when it collided with the motorcycle driven by Marion Lilly.
