WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY HAS GREAT OPPORTUNITY

Campaign of Oregon Laymen to Raise \$100,000 May Lead to a Very Large Endowment.

According to A. F. Flegal, chairman of the campaign executive committee of the Laymen's Association of Willamette University, there is excellent reason to believe that, if friends of the old school in the Northwest subscribe \$100,000 for its immediate needs, others who are watching the progress of the institution and are not waiting to see what is done now will come forward and make large contributions that will go to make the university a very much larger, one half two or three years have gone by.

The \$100,000 which the laymen of the Oregon conference are now seeking is for the immediate restoration of Walker hall, for men; completion of Lawrence hall, the women's dormitory, and a heating plant. With these improvements, which are as lately essential to the largest usefulness of the university in caring for pupils already enrolled and the usual annual increase, Willamette will be very well provided for on the present basis. Should there follow large gifts as predicted by Mr. Flegal of course a number of other buildings would be constructed and the entire activity of the school would be greatly enlarged.

The active canvassing for funds probably will be undertaken about next week. From all over the state have come to the members of the committee assurances of support. Many have said they know of no other means of investing money that will bring larger returns.

Marines' Commander in Meuse-Argonne Offensive Who Is Now Their Chief

Secretary of the Navy Daniels has announced the appointment of Major-General John A. Lejeune as major-general commanding the marine corps, to succeed Major-General George Barnett. General Lejeune commanded the famous second division when it broke the German line in the Meuse-Argonne offensive, and Secretary Daniels said the appointment was in line with the policy of the department to reward officers who served with distinction during the war. The new chief of the "Devil Dogs" commanded the second division not only in the Meuse-Argonne offensive but also at St. Mihiel and Mont Blanc ridge.

PROTESTANT PASTORS IN NEED OF RELIEF

Survey By Interchurch World Movement Reveals Pulpit's Poverty.

\$1242 IS HIGH AVERAGE SALARY

Local County Conference in April Will Show Necessity for Clinics and Homes for Aged and Infirm.

A large portion of the funds to be raised in the United Simultaneous Campaign of the Protestant denominations associated with the Interchurch World Movement will be used for American ministerial support and relief. It is greatly needed, according to leaders of the Interchurch Movement, who early in April are to hold the conference in this county.

As a result of the campaign now being made by the Interchurch World Movement the combined Protestant churches of America will provide many more hospitals, clinics and homes for the aged and infirm. An interesting feature of these Protestant hospitals will be free treatment for ministers, as recent surveys made by the Interchurch organization have made the need for special dispensations very obvious.

The following startling facts were divulged as to the average salaries in the various denominations. Starting with the highest, the average for Episcopal ministers is \$1,242; the average for Presbyterian (North), \$1,177; for the United Presbyterians, \$1,096; for the Reformed Church (Dutch), \$1,170; for the Methodist Episcopal (North), \$1,176; Congregational, \$1,042, and for the Baptists (Northern), \$850.

With government experts announcing that \$1,500 is the lowest salary upon which a family can be decently maintained and suggesting budgets for none lower, ministers have a discouraging outlook. Such things as hospital bills are almost impossible to meet, and yet every normal family has some illness in its midst every year. Accordingly the Interchurch Movement, while on its way to obtain higher averages in salaries, will assist by providing free care in its institutions.

INTERCHURCH MOVEMENT PLANS MEDICAL AID FOR CHINA

In no part of China is there a medical force at all adequate to the needs of the situation. In one province there is but one doctor to five millions of people, and missionaries living in lonely stations must travel many days to procure medical help in case of need.

The program of the Interchurch World Movement, based on a careful survey, will include the strengthening of present institutions and the opening of a large number of hospitals in new areas where they are most needed.

SUBMITS IDEAS ON ANTI-GAMBLING RULING

To The Hon. Mayor and City Council of Klamath Falls:

I understand that you have under consideration an ordinance designed or intended to assist in the elimination of gambling in our city. If I am correctly informed this ordinance proposes to require the removal from all pool halls of the chairs and tables.

As a citizen who has worked all his life with the dry forces to secure prohibition of the liquor traffic for our nation and I might add as one who neither plays pool nor cards, I respectfully protest against the passage of such an ordinance as being unjust and unfair to the honest men who patronize these places and who do not gamble, but rather use these resorts as their "club room."

My business as postmaster has frequently called me into our local pool rooms. I see a score of men, apparently laborers from the lumber camps and mills, sitting in chairs along the walls, many of them reading newspapers, others playing pool, and others playing cards.

I am a member of several lodges here. At our club rooms I see business men sitting in easy chairs reading newspapers, others at the pool table and still others playing cards at the card tables.

Now what is the difference? One is a crowd of business men enjoying a clubroom which is owned by them. The other is a crowd of workmen enjoying the free use of a "clubroom" furnished by the owner of the poolroom who desires their trade for soft drinks and cigars.

If you remove these chairs from the pool halls where are these men to go to find their clubroom privileges? We have no parks—no public rest rooms—no Y. M. C. A. or other similar institutions—not even a place where one may sit down and write a letter home outside of the hotel lobby.
