**GLOBE TROTTER TO LECTURE AT THE LIBERTY**

Paying his party's way by filming the country en route, Captain Walter Wanderwell, globe-trotter, who is now making his third trip around the world, is in Klamath Falls today. Local scenes were filmed this afternoon. Tonight Captain Wanderwell will give a lecture covering his eight years of wandering, illustrated with descriptive film, at the Liberty theater.

Wanderwell started his journeying in 1912 when he left his home in Posen, Poland, with three other boys, to walk around the world on a tour advertising the Boy Scouts. He has been wandering since, though his travels were interrupted by two years of war service, during which he won his military title, a wedding or so in the party, and other incidents.

He is accompanied by his wife, a California girl whom he married in Atlantic City, and with whom he walked across the continent to San Francisco on a honeymoon trip, arriving for the 1915 exposition. Other members of the party are Al Nelson, mechanic, and Miss Jeanne Hanson, correspondent. They are travelling in a specially built camping car, the sides of which are plastered with autographs and other writings gathered along the way. Francisco Villa, the Mexican bandit, inscribed his name on the side of the car before a price was put upon his head.

Captain Wanderwell expects to be on the road until 1928, and by that time to have covered 175,000 miles. The party is on the way north to Canada, thence to Europe. They had planned this year to tour central and

South America but ran into the Mexican revolution when it broke into Sonora two months ago and headed north again.
