SITE FOR BUILDING BOUGHT BY U. OF O

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 23.—The Board of Regents of the University has authorized the purchase of a ten acre tract of land adjoining the University on the south, known as the Gale tract. The land faces on Alder street, and lies west of and adjoining the I. O. O. F. cemetery and south of the cemetery ridge baseball diamond. Although plans have not yet been completed, work will start soon in erecting the new home of the School of Education upon this land. The new School of Education will comprise two buildings, similar in structure, one to house the school itself, and the other to be a model Junior High school, which will be used for practice by students of the school.
