**MONUMENT FOR CLEMENCEAU STARTS**  
PARIS, July 5. (By Mail).—Clemenceau is shown at the front, standing at the edge of a trench, with his friends, the French poilus below and about him, in the monument to be erected in his native country, the Vendee, early next year.  
Francois Ciard, the sculptor, is chiselling the group work out of hard Burgundian stone. Unfinished, the work is already said to visualize with great character, the scene so often pictured of the old "Tiger," mentally and almost physically, fighting for France.  
The premier's figure stands eight feet high. He is, as always in the war days, wearing the long, loose overcoat and the soft, slouchily crumpled hat, leaning on a cane. His face is toward the enemy, his eyes watching the horizon, following indications given him by a seated officer with maps, beside him. On his right are grouped soldiers and in the trench below are more of the men in the ranks, looking with mingled astonishment and admiration at their Minister of War.  
The scene is said by critics to be vividly natural, rough and muddy but heroic and full of the color and character of war days.

**WHISTLING TABOO IN ISLE OF GUAM**  
AGANA, Guam, June 26. (By Mail).—Whistling is prohibited in the city of Agana under the penalty of a \$5 fine by order of Captain Gilmer, governor of Guam and commander of the United States naval station here. His order reads:  
"The practice of whistling is an entirely unnecessary and irritating noise that must be discontinued. It is therefore ordered and decreed that no person shall whistle within the limits of the city of Agana."  
"The penalty for a violation of this order shall be an executive fine not to exceed five (\$5.00) dollars."  
"W. W. Gilmer, Governor of Guam."  
Captain Gilmer has absolute authority in making the laws of Guam, this perhaps being the only United States possession where one man has this power.

**BIL HAYWARD OFF FOR OLYMPIC GAMES**  
UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 26.—William L. Hayward, veteran University of Oregon athletic trainer, at present in Boston with Kenneth Bartlett and Arthur Tuck, Oregon athletes selected as members of the United States Olympic games track team, has announced his intentions of going to Antwerp, Belgium, with the team, to be a spectator at the international Olympic games to be held there this summer in case he should not be officially selected as a trainer for the American track team. This news was contained in a wire received at the administration offices of the university from Hayward.  
Bill Hayward has been a fixture at the University of Oregon since time immemorial, acting as head of the men's physical education department. He has been trainer of almost a score of Oregon track teams and trainer of many of the lemon-yellow football eleven. His ability as a trainer and track coach has made him a national figure in the world of sport. With Hayward along with the Olympic team, the condition of the two Oregon entries will in all likelihood be much better, and their best performance at the Antwerp meet assured.  
The election of James M. Cox would give the United States its sixth President bearing the Christian name of "James."

**LAKEVIEW WILL HAVE ROUNDUP**  
LAKEVIEW, Ore., July 26.—A big round-up celebration will be held here September 4, 5, and 6. A corporation has been organized to manage the affair, consisting of S. P. Dicks, president; W. V. Miller, vice president; Dan F. Brennan, secretary and treasurer; A. J. Ousley, W. Z. Moss, F. Reynolds and D. C. Gibbs, directors. The Bly Rodeo association will co-operate with the local association in making the affair a success.  
Several thousand dollars have been collected for a prize fund. Outlaw horses from practically every large ranch in Lake county and from many ranches in Klamath and Modoc counties have been secured and wild bulls and steers in plenty have been gathered from the ranges.  
Besides riding, roping, racing and other range sports there will be street parades, baseball games, etc., to amuse the visitor. September 5 falls on Sunday and the following day is Labor day, two holidays in succession are provided, and Lakeview is preparing to extend hospitality to thousands of visitors.
