### WHISTLING TABOO IN ISLE OF GUAM

AGANA, Guam, June 26. Mail.)-Whistling is prohibited in the city of Agana under the penalty of a \$6 fine by order of Captain Giler, governor of Guam and comdant of the United States naval ition here. His order reads:

"The practice of whistling is an entirely unnecessary and irritating solse that must be discontinued.

"It is therefore ordered and decreed that no person shall whistle within the limits of the city of Agana. .

"The penalty for a violation of this order shall be an executive fine not to exceed five (\$5.00) dollars.

"W. W. Gilmer, Governor of Guam."

Captain Gilmer has absolute authority in making the laws of Guam. this perhaps being the only United States possession where one man has this power.
