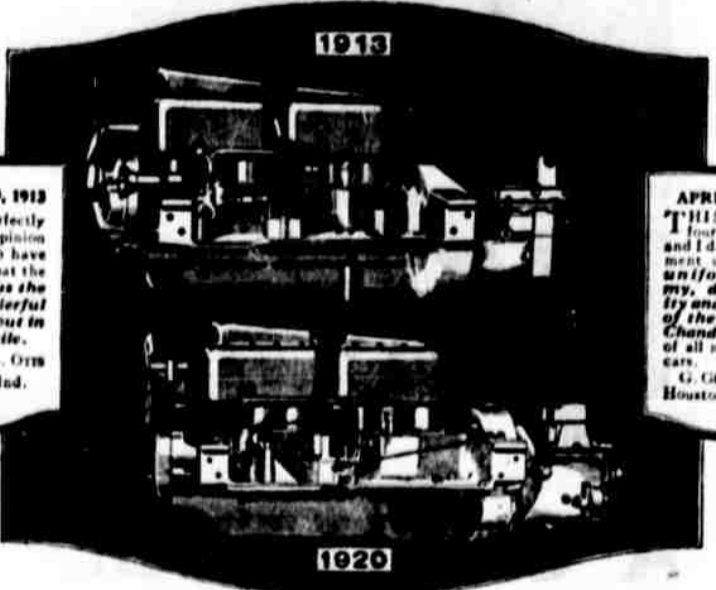

SAYS AMERICA NEEDS FIND LIBERTY IN LAW

lection of seeds, the necessity for rotation of crops, fertilization, judging of types of grain and animals, the chemistry of the soil and why plants grow. It is a wonderfully interesting science and if properly placed before the young men, they will become enthusiastic over it. The farm boy will see that his avocation is entitled to rank first in the list of all activities. He will learn that instead of being ashamed of his life business, he may well be proud of it, show by farm accounting how profitable farming is under prevailing conditions, how permanent and safe it is as a business, and that with good roads and the automobile, the farm home is not isolated, that good times may be had on the farm. By lectures and moving pictures and practical demonstrations made with the help of the boys, accentuate interest in farming. When these town and city boys return to their homes, they will have a story to tell of the wonders of this new life that has been opened before them.

A large percentage of them, without doubt, would want to try it, therefore the government should establish at these training schools bureaus of registration where those who wish to go out upon the farms may find the right types of homes, where they will be well paid, properly treated and made happy; and at the conclusion of the season these boys will be enthusiastic advocates of agriculture as a life business, and some of them will surely go into it.

Boy Psychology

If anyone should question the psychology of his proposition, suppose 200 typical farm boys and a like number of sturdy lads from the cities were to be placed in a mining camp, like Leadville or Cripple Creek, when mining was at its height, where the main topic of discussion was mining, where operations were being carried on, the ore brought up and smelted; and if they saw all this, would they not become enthusiastic over the subject of mining, and would not many of them go into it and fail to return to their farm and city homes? There is no doubt that this would be the case, and if so with mining, why not with farming?

The government is fully justified in carrying this campaign of education to almost any extent on the ground that we are facing a food shortage that is alarming to contemplate.

Universal training in citizenship, in Americanization and consolidating and unifying our citizens, can only be brought about by the authority of congress to call together the boys at the cantonments, where all classes will be represented and all boys will have an opportunity of training, discipline and vocational instruction necessary to build up a sound and enduring citizenship, and where they will early understand the duties and obligations they owe the country, and will give these boys sufficient training, development and discipline, so that in case of an emergency, they can quickly become efficient defenders of their country. It will develop our man-power, it will stabilize our industries and bring about an era of good fellowship and give us universal brotherhood through universal training.
