AMUNDSEN READY FOR ANOTHER TRIP

SEATTLE, Wn., July 28.—First circumnavigation of the globe thru the narrow ways between the Arctic ice pack and the northern edges of Europe and America can be claimed, it has been pointed out, by Roald Amundsen, Norwegian explorer, when he arrives at Nome, Alaska, this summer.

Amundsen cannot claim a continuous journey around this northern rim, however, for the first leg was completed in 1906 when he discovered the long-sought Northwest Passage around America from the Atlantic to the Pacific. On this journey he sailed westward from Norway and ended his trip to Nome.

The second leg of the journey is being completed this summer. In 1918 he again left Norway, but sailed east, around Europe and Asia. He is expected to arrive at Nome soon on this trip.

Amundsen is going to Nome to outfit for a dash to the North Pole, according to Captain George Tonneson, one of the explorer's lieutenants, who arrived here recently after leaving Amundsen in the northern seas off the Siberian coast.

Amundsen is the discoverer of the South Pole. He hopes to reach the North Pole to refute or confirm the claims of the late Rear-Admiral Robert E. Peary to the discovery of the northern tip of the world.

SYDNEY, N. S., July 12. (By Mail.)—Residents of this city are beginning to wonder whether it is still in order to pity Captain Thomas Kitchen, the Canadian Field Artillery officer whose fiancée, Miss A. Butler of Manchester, Eng., transferred her affections to Lieutenant T. Miller while en route to Halifax to marry the captain.

UNIVERSITY MAN KNOWS HARDING

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 29.—Another boyhood friend of Warren G. Harding, Republican nominee for president, has been discovered living in Oregon, in the person of Dr. Chester L. Carlisle, now in Eugene acting as director of the Oregon state survey of mental defectives, delinquents and dependents, which is being conducted by the University of Oregon at the request of the legislature.

Dr. Carlisle lived in Marion, Ohio, Harding's home town, for many years and was in the same high school class as Miss Abigail Harding, the candidate's sister. "Senator Harding is a fine example of a self-made American," said Dr. Carlisle, who went on to recount the history of the Marion Daily Star, the newspaper owned by Harding, who bought it when it was a run-down weekly, and developed it into a modern daily with a large circulation and a wide influence.

Dr. Carlisle is not only acquainted with Senator Harding, but with the other members of his family. Mrs. Carrie Harding Votaw, the candidate's younger sister, and George T. Harding, now a physician in Columbus, Ohio, were in the same high school at Marion which Dr. Carlisle attended.

The acquaintance of Dr. Carlisle with Senator Harding was discovered by members of the faculty of the University of Oregon when Dr. Carlisle mentioned that he had received letters from Marion telling of the dedication ceremonies planned for July 22.
