WASHINGTON, July 29.—William R. Williams, of Richmond, Va., was today appointed assistant secretary of war, succeeding Benedict Crowell, who resigned recently.

NEW YORK, July 29.—Three all metal monoplanes, carrying the first transcontinental mail, left the Central field at eight minutes after ten this morning for San Francisco.

CALIFORNIA NEWS

CHICO, July 29.—The body of Clyde Jenkins, Chico soldier who was drowned when the Tuscania was sunk February 17, 1918, off the Irish coast, is to be returned here for final burial, according to word received here from his mother, Mrs. E. W. Barber of Los Angeles. His body was washed ashore three days after the accident and he was buried in Scotland.

MARYSVILLE, July 29.—The Board of Supervisors has pledged its support to a drainage project to take in about about 50,000 acres between Live Oak and Yuba City.

YREKA, July 29.—To consider ways and means for obtaining a larger water supply, citizens of Yreka held a meeting Monday night, when it was decided to pump water from the old Blue Gray mine, two miles from the city into the municipal well.

PLACERVILLE, July 29.—A fire which started on the Hartwick property, near Camanche, has spread into the El Dorado National Forest and according to reports received here has swept over a vast tract of timber land.

JACKSON, July 29.—Wanted here to face a charge of embezzling \$1175 from the American Express company, F. E. Burleson, former agent for this company, was captured Monday night in Salt Lake City.

QUINCY, July 29.—Coroner Hogan was called to Portola Sunday to investigate the death of little Helen Kilgore. The child swallowed a pin the first of July and was brought to Portola for medical treatment by her parents from Sand Pass, Nevada. She died soon after arriving in Portola. The pin was found to have pierced her intestines. She was 26 months old.

RED BLUFF, July 29.—A fire on the Van Sant ranch seven miles west of this city destroyed practically every building on the place. A fine residence and a barn and blacksmith shop with all tools were destroyed.

SACRAMENTO, July 29.—Mrs. Rosalia Gabriel Bridgwell, a woman

of known musical talents and an active worker in war relief societies, particularly the United Daughters of the Confederacy, Thursday night passed away at the home of her daughter.

RED BLUFF, July 29.—Claire Exley, a prominent citizen of this place was found dead in the rear of his mother's home on Monroe street. The body had lain in the yard for probably 43 hours.

CHICO, July 29.—Frank Boucher, aged 59, life-long Chico resident, died at the Enloe hospital from the effects of a bullet which he fired into his brain a few hours earlier at his home in Chapmantown.

CORDELIA, July 29.—After a protracted illness, Eugene I. McKean passed away at the family home in Cordelia at the age of 74 years, of which nearly 70 have been spent in California.

MEXICANS DENY AID TO GERMANY

MEXICO CITY, July 19. (By Mail.)—Denial of published charges that the national wireless station at Chapultepec was used to communicate with Germany during the world war and that its personnel is German in its most important component is made in a statement printed by El Heraldo de Mexico over the signature of F. Frias, the new director-general of the national telegraph lines.

According to Senor Frias, the Chapultepec plant was in process of construction from the middle of 1917 to the middle of 1919 and, because it could not function at full efficiency during that time, communication with Nauen was an impossibility.

Senor Frias asserts that the only Germans connected with the station are employed in the shop annexes and are engaged exclusively in making new wireless equipment for sub-

stations, while Mexicans direct and operate the station.

The Mexican wireless system, Senor Frias states, consists of 23 stations, 14 on the coasts and 9 in the interior. The coastal stations are mainly for maritime service, while the interior stations, with Chapultepec, are for the service of the government, especially when other lines of communication are cut, a contingency he declares has been, unfortunately, common during the last 10 years.

GERMAN UNIVERSITIES BEMOAN CONDITIONS

BERLIN, July 8. (By Mail.)—German universities have been hard hit by the depreciation of the mark. "The ruin of German currency," says Dr. Ernst Troeltsch, professor of philosophy at the University of Berlin, "has enclosed German science and education in a kind of Chinese wall which is strengthened by other countries' hatred of Germany, especially France's."
