Ownership is their right and should be encouraged by parents. bankers, merchants and leaders of boys' and girls' work of every kind.

Ownership encourages boys and girls to advance themselves, prepare themselves for useful and successful lives and spells their success.

Ownership for boys and girls encourages them not only in their own projects and plans, but where they have a personal interest they are more willing to help father and mother with the larger farm undertakings. The boys and girls owning something and having a right to whatever financial returns there may be are always ready and willing to help bring success in general to the farm home.

Instead of working hardship to dad's plans, the boy who has a calf will do twice as much for father than if he had no personal interest. It is not necessary that the club project should interfere or conflict with the general farm plans. It is true that the calf, or pig, or pen of chickens should have a separate pen and a pasture, if possible, but this is sometimes inconvenient and, if so, approximate records may be kept.

Farm parents who encourage their boys and girls to have something of their own and enjoy the privileges of ownership will find it one of the best investments they can make. Without ownership and a personal interest farm boys and girls will leave the old farm for the city, as soon as they are well up in their 'teens.
