OBREGON NOW BUSINESS MAN

NOGALES, Ariz., Aug. 3.—General Alvaro Obregon is a business man and proud of being so regarded. He is in Nogales, Sonora, looking after his business interests prior to going into the southern Mexican states for the final swing of the campaign for the presidency of Mexico as successor to Provisional President de la Huerta.

General Obregon arrived in Nogales from Guaymas in a special train July 5. Since his arrival he has given his entire time to his private business as a broker in garbanzos, known in the States as "chick peas."

"I never was so happy in my life as when I shed my uniform as a general and got into civilian clothes and back to my work," said the general. "Until the election in Mexico is passed I will not talk politics nor make statements dealing with national or international relations in or of Mexico. I am just a plain business man and Mexican citizen. I have built my business by hard work and I intend to give it sole attention while here. When I go for politics I will drop business."

General Obregon announced he will remain in Nogales until on or about July 20, when he will leave for Southern Mexico and his work as presidential candidate in Mexico. Meanwhile, he is avoiding politics. His office is in a modest two-story back building adjoining the International Line, is a busy spot and much like that of any ordinary American businessman of affairs working at high pressure.

GROVE OF SEQUOIAS

AUBURN, Cal., Aug. 3.—Placer county, California, possesses a grove of big trees that compare favorably with the wonders of the Yosemite. The grove, a small one, is in the mountains above the town of Forest Hill, and due to lack of roads and trails is visited by only a few persons annually.

The Auburn Automobile club has asked the co-operation of the forest service in preserving the trees and making them accessible to the tourist public.

MEMORIAL TREE

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Aug. 3.—The memorial tree planted in honor of Lieut. John Black Clarke in the garden of the home of Edward Gilbert has been registered on the national honor roll being compiled by the American Forestry association at Washington, according to word received here by Mrs. Gilbert. Lieut. Clarke was in the Rainbow division and was killed in the Argonne drive.

NEW PENCIL SUPPLY

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Aug. 3.—Pencil wood may soon be taken from the Manzano forest, near here, said to be the largest cedar forest in the southwest. A representative of an eastern pencil manufacturing firm recently inspected the forest. He said the eastern supply of cedar, which pencil companies have depended upon, is practically gone.

FIND PLEASANT SPOT FOR SUNDAY OUTING

The Laboree ranch, up in the Sprague river country, one of the prettiest and most inviting parts of the wonderful Klamath lake district, was chosen as their Sunday playground by Captain and Mrs. J. W. Siemens, and Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Peters, who motored out to this beauty spot in the morning and returned in the evening more firmly convinced that, as a "region desirable," this part of creation is in a class by itself. This ranch is irrigated by both the north and south forks of the Sprague river, and as an illustration of its immensity and productivity, Captain Siemens stated that 600 or more tons of splendid hay will be taken from it this year, and that that amount represents only a small part of what the ranch is capable of producing.

Coming home via the Saddle mountain road, the party visited the new Saddle mountain mill, and found approximately 250,000 feet of logs in the river. The mill has at its disposal 2,000,000 feet of cut timber, and within a week or 10 days will undoubtedly be ready to begin sawing. The captain and his party found this outing one of the most pleasant in their experiences, and recommend it to all who want real recreation and information relative to local activities combined.

Eight hundred million spools, with a market value of nearly one million dollars, are turned out every year by the spool factories in Maine. White birch is the material used almost exclusively in this industry. The machines for making spools are complicated and require skilled men in their operations. The spools drop from the lathes at the rate of one per second, and must be perfectly uniform and true. The finished spools are marketed largely in New York, Connecticut and Rhode Island.
