CALIFORNIA NEWS

SACRAMENTO, Cal., August 3.—When he struck a match under a dynamite cap which he found while rummaging around in the basement of his home at 3250 San Diego Way, 11-year-old Truman Fassett had a narrow escape from fatal injury, shortly after noon today. The cap exploded and the boy was struck in his chest, face and thighs by flying bits of copper. Some of the pieces were removed at the Emergency hospital but others, deeply imbedded were not touched. In all, 110 body punctures were found.

ST. HELENA, Aug. 3.—Robert White of Napa was killed and Thomas Niel, Pope Valley merchant, was seriously injured when the automobile in which they were riding fell from a bridge near the Eubanks place in Chiles Canyon last night.

MARYSVILLE, Aug. 3.—John Henry Lubman, 24, died today as the result of injuries received in a fall from a pole at Nicolaus, Sutter county, last Monday. Lubman was employed as lineman by the Pacific Gas and Electric company and was engaged in working on a pole when the strap which held him to the pole gave way and he fell to the ground, a distance of about thirty feet.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 3.—George Worden, 22, a carpenter, fell six stories here, but police surgeons could find no injuries except a broken rib.

DAVIS, Aug. 3.—Four pure-bred bulls were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the bull shed at the University Farm here.

FOLSOM, Aug. 3.—Word has been received here of the death in Berkeley of James Henry Burnham, retired business man and banker of this city. He died Wednesday, following a lingering illness of one year.
