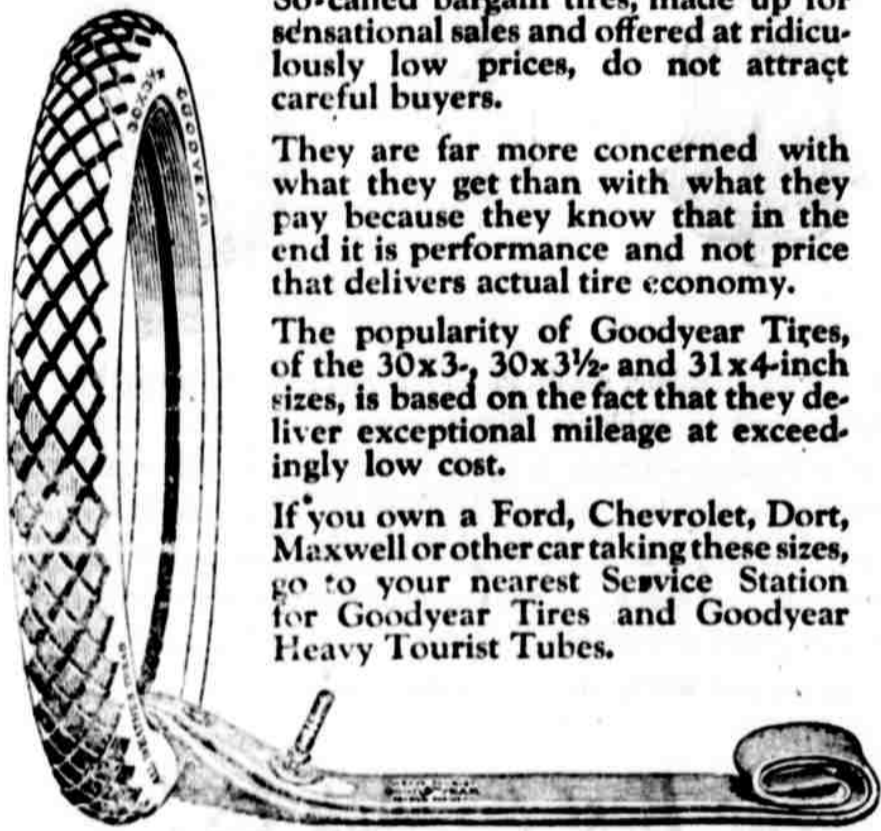

fell" which was in 1833. "Maise George" told her to remember that she was 29 years old.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, did by ordinance No. 514 duly adopted on the 2nd of August, 1929, approved by the mayor on the 2nd day of August, 1929, declare the proportionate assessment upon each lot, part of lot, block and acreage property found to be benefited and liable for a proportionate share of the cost of improving Washington Street from First Street easterly to 3rd Street, including intersections. The property so assessed by said ordinance is all that property lying adjacent to said parts of said street between the above mentioned termini and extending laterally to the center of the respective blocks lying adjacent to said parts of said street so far as the proposed improvement extends thereon, including properties in the quarters of the four blocks abounding any intersection involved in said proposed improvement.
