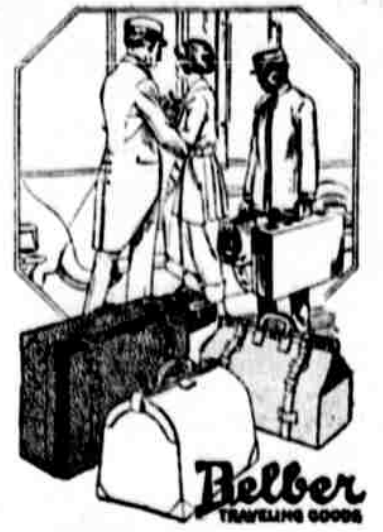

Police examination demonstrated that the killing of the girls who were carried off by force and slain was due to an idea obtained at a movie show. Films for children henceforth will receive a special censorship.

**KIDDIES ENJOY COUNTRY LIVING**

COLFAX, Cal., Aug. 5.—A quart of milk for each one daily, fresh eggs, fresh fruits, sleeping in screened bedrooms and unlimited room in which to play, is the lot of forty-five children brought from Sacramento to the summer camp established one and a half miles west of here. Most of the children are from poor families and many have a tendency toward tuberculosis.

After three or four weeks of out-of-doors life the children will be returned to their homes and others brought to occupy the camp, and this will continue until late summer.

The camp is owned and maintained by the Sacramento County Tuberculosis Association.
