SINN FEINERS HAVE OWN COURT SYSTEM

DUBLIN, July 9. (By Mail.)—The Sinn Feiners have established a judicial system for Ireland composed of parish courts, district courts and a court of final appeal.

All judges have to take the oath of allegiance to Dail Eireann, and all litigants must agree not to submit to any enemy tribunal any matter on which the Republican courts may pronounce a decision. The judges of the parish courts receive one pound a day for expenses and the district judges two pounds. The costs of the courts are provided out of deposits collected from the litigants.

The Council of the Irish Bar has decided that it is professional misconduct for a member of the Bar to appear before any of these courts; but there are many Irish barristers willing to appear for a suitable fee before the Republican courts.

The government treats all these courts in civil matters as really arbitrations with which they are not concerned. But in criminal matters they are regarded as illegal and persons punished by them are entitled to the protection of the police.
