No Delivery After August 15

Beginning August 15, 1920, the B. P. Lewis store will share its profits with its customers who buy for cash. At the same time this will help to reduce the H. C. L., for you know as well as we do that cash buys goods cheaper than credit. Cash will enable us to purchase our supplies at a much less figure than at present, and we in turn can give our customers the benefit of this saving. This we will do in three ways:

FIRST: We will give a five per cent discount for cash purchases only—purchases must amount to one dollar or more.

SECOND: We will give our customers the benefit of cheaper prices due to our ability to buy our goods from wholesale houses at less cost for cash than credit.

THIRD: No Delivery or Auto Expenses. Regular customers, who buy on the monthly payment plan, will receive a two per cent discount, only in case their bills are paid by the tenth day after they become due. If not paid by the tenth after becoming due, 8% interest will be charged on the monthly purchases.

All bills due on the account books Aug. 15, 1920, and not paid by August 25, 1920, will draw 8% interest from date of purchase to date of settlement. With fairness to all customers, this rule will be applied impartially, without regard to individuals. We trust that everyone affected by this new ruling will see to it that his bills are settled in due time to avoid the added expense of interest.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, did by ordinance No. 514 duly adopted on the 2nd of August, 1920, approved by the mayor on the 2nd day of August, 1920, declare the proportionate assessment upon each lot, part of lot, block and acreage property found to be benefited and liable for a proportionate share of the cost of improving Washington Street from First Street easterly to 3rd Street, including intersections. The property so assessed by said ordinance is all that property lying adjacent to said parts of said street between the above mentioned termini and extending laterally to the center of the respective blocks lying adjacent to said parts of said street so far as the proposed improvement extends thereon, including properties in the quarters of the four blocks abounding any intersection involved in said proposed improvement.
