MONTANA ROAD-BOOSTERS ADVOCATE \$15,000,000 BONDS

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 14.—With C. R. Brazier of Helena in charge, those behind the project to submit a referendum to the people, November 2 next, for a bond issue of \$15,000,000 for good roads have opened state headquarters here. The money if voted, will be used throughout the entire state and, added to federal appropriations, will give, during the next five years, from \$30,000,000 to \$50,000,000 to good highways. It is estimated.
