TERMS OF BIDS ON GOVT SHIPS ANNOUNCED

Washington, Aug. 17.—Terms on which the shipping board fleet of more than 1200 steel vessels will be sold to private interests under the new merchant marine act were announced today by Chairman Benson. Bids will be entertained, the chairman said, at minimum prices of \$160 a deadweight ton for coal burners, and \$170 a deadweight ton for oilburners built on the great lakes, and \$175 and \$185, respectively, for coal and oilburners of over 10,000 tons weight.

POLITICAL ANNOUNCEMENT

As candidate for county commissioner I take this opportunity to state my position on certain questions:

COURT HOUSE: This matter certainly should be settled soon—must be settled soon. In the absence of a direct vote at this time, I favor the following: If Judge Hamilton's decision is reversed, the Main street building must be paid for, and should be occupied. If his decision is affirmed, the building already belongs to the county, without further payments, and should at once be occupied. With the county's records in imminent danger, it is almost criminal not to occupy it now: If the county possesses equities in the Hot Springs site, they should be liquidated to the county's best interest.

ROADS: Favor thorough co-operation with State and National highway efforts, always insisting that we get our money's worth. The county should adopt a progressive and aggressive road policy that would embrace every community. Either by redistricting or direct appropriation a just part of the road money raised in each community should be spent there. With efficient local supervisors, headed by a competent county road superintendent, headway should be made in a county road program.

SCHOOLS: With wide experience as a school man, we are able to comprehend the needs of the school. Favor liberal county support in order to ease up on burdensome, and often unjust, special taxes. Our county high school, which is directly under county control, as well as our rural high schools, will receive my particular attention.

GENERAL: Favor rigid economy in the conduct of the county's affairs. Reckless and extravagant expenditure of funds should cease.
