The City Engineer, pursuant to Resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having on the 19th day of July, 1920, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving the alley passing from 5th to 6th Streets, parallel with Main Street through the center of Block 37, original town of Klamath Falls, Oregon, same being bounded on the northerly side by lots 5 to 14 inclusive and on the southerly side by lots 1, 2, 3 and 4 of said Block 37, and the Council having taken the same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory.

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, that said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of said alley be, and the same are hereby approved, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said alley in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates, said improvements to consist of paving said alley with bitulithic pavement at an estimated cost of \$1,655.00; oil macadam pavement at an estimated cost of \$1,030.00 or concrete pavement at an estimated cost of \$1,487.00, said improvement in either event to include grading and rolling said alley; said improvement to be 15 feet wide throughout its entire distance, and
