WILL ELECTRIFY SWISS R. R. LINES

BERNE, Switzerland, Aug. 9. (By Mail).—An electric power plant to develop 350,000 horsepower is planned on Saint Gothard mountain. The cost is estimated at about \$100,000,000.

Two little villages where live 1,200 people must be moved out of the Urseren valley which will be dammed and will become a great lake. The power is to be utilized chiefly for the Swiss electric railways.

WANT BROADER POWERS FOR COMMISSION

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 26.—Broadening of the power and improvement of the practice of the Federal Trade Commission in order to bring about a more satisfactory administration of justice by it, was recommended in the report of the committee on commerce, trade and commercial law, presented at the convention of the American Bar Association here today.

The committee recommended that the commission be empowered to investigate all branches of anti-trust laws, and that proceedings in reference to these laws should be transferred from courts to the commission with the right to appeal from the commission to the federal courts.

The report also recommended that all cases falling within the anti-trust laws should be primarily instituted before the commission.
"The Federal Trade Commission," for the purpose of investigation, ought to be permitted not only to continue, "having jurisdiction complete the investigation, but to enter an order in conformity with its findings subject to right of appeal."

To carry out this suggestion, the committee advocated amendments to the Federal Trade Commission Law, the Clayton Act, and "all federal anti-trust laws."

The report also urged that the commission render written opinions on "at least" every new case coming before it to establish a system of law and precedent that will enable the business of the country to know what the law is on a given point.

The committee made no recommendation on a proposed amendment to the Transportation Act, which would make the chairmanship of the Interstate Commerce Commission permanent instead of rotating. The

report stated, however, that the committee favored such a plan.
Stressing the importance of codifying the law of sales in interstate and foreign commerce, and the law of common carriers in interstate and foreign commerce, the report stated the committee favored the drafting of bills proposing to provide the necessary legislation.

SAYS ENGLAND HAS BEST PHONE SERVICE

LONDON, Aug. 10. (By Mail).—Announcement by Pike Pease, the assistant postmaster general, that the American telephone system is now inferior to that in this country, is disputed by Sir Joseph Duveen, who divides his time equally between this country and the United States. In an interview with the Pall Mall Gazette Sir Joseph said:

"The telephone service here can only be described as rotten. If the postmaster general does not realize the difference between the American and British services, he should send a few men to New York for a month, and tell them to note the differences, and then learn how it is done."

"Personally, in America, I practically spend all my day on the telephone. Here I hardly ever use it. I have neither the time nor patience. The service, like Mr. Pease's statement, is a joke."

MEXICAN AERIAL MAIL STARTED

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 12. (By Mail).—Establishment of air mail service between Mexico City and Tampico has been determined by the government, according to Cosme Hinojosa, postmaster general.

By authorization of Provisional President Adolfo de la Huerta, a small flotilla of airplanes, of Mexican manufacture, will be utilized.

It is believed that the trip from Mexico City to the gulf port can be made in about three hours. There will be no intermediate stops. A trial flight will be made before the end of the present month, it was announced.
