The story of a chivalrous hobo—a knight of the road who has lost all semblance to his former gentlemanly self except his instinctive kindness and honesty, is told in "Overland Red," a photodrama starring Harry Carey, which will be shown at the Liberty theater Sunday.

A Harry Carey picture is always a welcome event, and this show should prove to be particularly interesting. "Overland Red" differs in many ways from the usual Harry Carey

story, but it permits the star to exercise all those arts in which he excels. He does rough riding of all sorts—on horseback, on a racing motor down a steep mountain road, and on the brake-beams of a fast-flying limited.

The finding of a dying man on the desert, by Overland Red, the discovery of gold and a map on his person, the arrest of Red and his young pal by a crooked sheriff, and their escape through the aid of a girl, forms a lively chain of events. Humor and romance are not overlooked in the story, and the Carey smile is much in evidence throughout.
