## EX-SHOEMAKER TIRED OF JOB AS GOVERNOR

**MEXICO CITY, Aug. 6. (By Mail).**—Celestino Gasca, former shoemaker, now governor of the federal district which comprises Mexico City, is trying to abolish his own office.

Senor Gasca contends that his work is not necessary, since there is a city council in existence well able to handle the municipal affairs of the capital.

Pointing out the frequent conflicts of authority resulting from the present dual system of administering the affairs of the capital, Governor Gasca said:

"I am planning to submit to the President of the republic a legal project for the abolition of the federal district government. I believe it to be superfluous."

When the news of Governor Gasca's plan spread to the employes of the federal district, dismay is reported to have ensued. It is pointed out, however, that most of these employes can be retained under the city council system.
