MANY WANT A SEAT IN SENATE

RENO, Nev., Aug. 31.—Nevada voters, at a state primary election September 7, will nominate candidates for United States senator to succeed Senator Charles B. Henderson, of Elko, and for member of the house of representatives to succeed Congressman Charles R. Evans, of Goldfield, the state's lone delegate to the lower house. Henderson and Evans, both Democrats, are running for renomination. Henderson is unopposed on the party ticket.

Miss Anne Martin, of Reno, nationally known suffrage worker, will be an independent candidate at the primary for nomination for senator. If elected she will be the first woman to sit in the upper house of congress.

Three candidates, Tasker L. Oddie, former governor, Rev. Drewwater Adams, pastor of a Reno Baptist church, and Grant Miller, former senatorial candidate on the Socialist ticket, are contesting for the Republican nomination for senator. The successful aspirant will oppose Senator Henderson in the general election in November.

Two other Democrats, Walter C. Pratt and Richard C. Stoddard, prohibition director for the Nevada district, are opposing Representative Evans for the Democratic nomination. On the Republican ticket, William T. McNeil, of Reno, and Samuel Arenz, of Lovelock, are running for the nomination for congress.

STANFORD TEAM BEING FORMED

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Aug. 30.—Candidates for the 1920 Stanford University football team have been ordered by Head Coach Walter I. Powell and Captain A. P. Holt to report for opening practice September 15. Although Stanford has lost many members of the 1919 varsity, Powell and Holt think they will have material for a winning eleven.

Captain Holt, according to early reports, has not recovered entirely from injuries received playing last season. He is expected, however, to be able to take his old place in the backfield.

Two varsity football players, J. C. Patrick and C. R. Righter, are with the California team at the Antwerp Olympic games but are expected to return in time to play in all of the games. Patrick, it is believed, will be fullback this year. Righter was center on the 1919 eleven.

Stanford's backfield ranks will be strengthened by the addition of R. W. Arnett, a former army player who has been mentioned by eastern sport writers for the All-American eleven. A prospect for tackle, Howard Deems, has transferred from Occidental College, Los Angeles, and will be eligible here this year.

FLY AND BAIT CASTERS TO MEET

COLUMBUS, Ohio, August 31.—Fly and bait casting enthusiasts from over the country, including state, national and world champions will make Columbus their mecca September 1 to 5, when the twelfth annual tournament of the National Association of Scientific Angling clubs will be held here in connection with the state fair.

The event will be under the auspices of the Columbus Casting club in connection with the state department of agriculture and the bureau of fish and game. More than \$2500 in trophies will be awarded.

Some of the champions who will participate include Fred Peet world's champion long distance fly caster, William Stanley, champion bait caster, and C. J. McCarthy, regarded among sportsmen as the world's most consistent fly and bait caster, all of Chicago.

Perry Frazier, New York champion fly caster and B. F. Slagel of Kalamazoo, also plan to participate, as well as other famous anglers and fly and bait casters.
