LEGION POST IS STARTED IN S. A.

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 21.—The recently organized Buenos Aires post of the American Legion will be known as "Spencer Ely Post." Spencer Ely was the first American residing in Argentina to volunteer to serve his country in France and the first to fall of the Argentine contingent.

On his arrival in France, Ely joined the 145th regiment (the old fighting 69th, of New York) and was killed at Chateau Thierry. After having been wounded in action he was carried to a dressing station from which he refused to be removed until more seriously wounded comrades had been taken to the rear. Before his turn came, the dressing station was blown up by a German shell.

Ely was a native of Flushing, New York, and a descendant of General Schuyler, of the American revolution. His family has resided in Buenos Aires for about 12 years.

REPUBLICAN SENATE NEEDED SAYS DIRECTOR

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 21.—Secretary Hotchkiss of the Republican state central committee yesterday received a letter from United States Senator Harry S. New, national director of the speakers bureau, calling the attention of the state central committee to the importance of the November congressional campaign. The letter follows:

"Attention is particularly directed to the great importance of electing a Republican congress. In 32 of the states, United States senators are to be chosen and a member of the house of representatives is to be elected in every congressional district.

"Speakers are urged especially to stress the importance of returning Republican members of both houses.

"A Republican president will be powerless to carry out the party program unless supported by a Republican congress.

"Both domestic and foreign policies are dependent upon this, and too much importance cannot be attached to this feature of the campaign."

GRANT COUNTY SHEEP POISONED BY WOOD

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 20.—Approximately 400 out of a flock of 700 sheep belonging to J. H. Hinton, Grant county, died recently as the result of eating lupine, a poisonous weed, according to Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian.

Dr. Lytle said that livestock ordinarily would not eat lupine, and that few deaths among sheep had been caused by the weed. The sheep lost by Mr. Hinton were being transferred to new pasture, and the owner believes they obtained a quantity of lupine along the road. The monetary loss is estimated at \$3,100.
