YANKEE SOLDIER OF FORTUNE IN POLISH FIGHT

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—War despatches making more than casual mention of Brigadier General Charles Sweeny have lent to the Polish struggle more than an impersonal interest to American army officers at Governors Island, who are well acquainted with Sweeny—an American soldier of fortune with both principle and purse.

Men of no fortune at all who fight in any old or young army for the sake of excitement and paltry pay are common enough. But Sweeny, U. S. A., is a notable exception. He is a multi-millionaire's son, his father having amassed great wealth in the famous Coeur D'Alene mines of Washington and Idaho, and the soldier is more than a millionaire in his own right.

He put in three years at West Point and then sought the life of an active soldier. In Mexico, South and Central America and Europe he has struck blows in desperate causes.

Sweeny, a former lieutenant-colonel in the United States army, attached to the general staff, was in Paris during the spring of 1919, recovering from wounds suffered in the Argonne offensive with the American expeditionary forces when he learned that Poland was in need of officers for her new armies. He consulted with the then Premier Paderewski and offered to recruit volunteers when he returned to America to be mustered out of the service. In three weeks he had selected 200 former American army officers, all of whom had seen service in many battles in France. Colonel Sweeny sailed for Poland in September of last year with the first of his officer contingent.

He was not long in getting into the "Polish Red" fight and in recognition of his splendid services Poland commissioned him a brigadier general. Recent dispatches say that he has been marked out by his gallantry and leadership.

This Irish-American-Polish general for whom a soft life has held no appeal, began his career on the battlefield on leaving West Point after he tried mining for a while.

He went to Mexico and got his "baptism of fire" and a wound in the Madero affair. Upon recovery, Sweeny packed up for South America where he took a hand in several of the revolutions.

He got into the world war as a private in the Foreign Legion. In the first Champagne battle in September 1915, Sweeny was commissioned a lieutenant on the field for conspicuous gallantry. He was severely wounded and gassed in this battle, and on a hospital cot in Paris, he was awarded the Cross of the Legion of Honor.

Two other important decorations were bestowed on him in rapid succession and he had a great reputation for bravery. Soon after being made a captain in the French forces, he was sent to the United States upon advice of Ambassador Sharp, as an instructor in 1917.

Sweeny was commissioned a major in the United States army and helped to train the 80th division at Camp Lee, Va. He went overseas with this division, got badly "shot up" in the Argonne and was promoted to lieutenant colonel for gallantry before the enemy, and assigned to the general staff of the A. E. F.

M. Deschanel, President of the French Republic, was born on the 13th, married on the 13th, and it was on the 13th of January that the Chamber of Deputies declared him a candidate for the Presidency.

PETITION

In the County Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Klamath. In the Matter of the Organization of the Wocus Drainage District. To the Honorable County Court of Klamath County, Oregon: Petition.

The undersigned, your petitioners, respectfully petition and show:

I. That they desire to organize and form a drainage district to be known as the Wocus Drainage District under and in accordance with Chapter 340 of the General Laws of the State of Oregon for 1915 (page 540) filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 26, 1915; as amended by Chapter 414 of General Laws of the State of Oregon for 1917; as amended by chapters 184, 142, 29, 390 General Laws of the State of Oregon for 1919.

II. The description of all lands included therein are as follows:
In Township 38 South of Range 8 East W. M.

Section 7; Lots 2, 14, 9 and 8, and the South half of the Southeast quarter, and lots 1, 2, 10 and 5.

Section 8; Lots 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10.

Section 9; Lots 4, 5, 6, 7 and South half of the Southeast quarter.

Section 10; South half of the Southwest quarter.

Section 15; Northwest quarter, and Lots 3, 4, 9, 10 and 11.

Section 16; all of Section.

Section 17; North half, Southeast quarter, East half of Southwest quarter, Northwest quarter of the Southwest quarter, Lot 3, and Northwest quarter.

Section 18; North half of Northeast quarter, Southeast quarter of Northeast quarter, Northeast quarter of Southeast quarter, and Lots 5, 6, 7 and 8.

Section 20; Northeast quarter, Northeast quarter of Northwest quarter, North half of Southeast quarter, and Lots 5, 7, 8, 9 and 10.

Section 21; all of Section.

Section 22; West half, Lots 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8, and 2 and Southwest quarter of Northeast quarter.

Also that part of Lot 1 of Section 23, and that part of Lots 2 and 5 of Section 15 which lies west of the following line, to-wit: Beginning at the Northeast corner of Lot 2 of said section 23, thence North 1435 feet to the center of the "Neck" thence North 38 degrees 51 minutes West 4145 feet following "Neck" to intersection with north and south center line of Section 15.

Section 25; Southwest quarter of Southwest quarter.

Section 26; All fractional Section 25 except Lots 1 and 4.

quarter; South half of Southwest quarter, and Southeast quarter.

Section 26; North half of Northeast quarter, and West half.

In Township 39 South of Range 8 East W. M.

Section 2; North half of Northeast quarter, and Southwest quarter of northeast quarter.

All of the above described lands constitute a contiguous body of swamp; wet and overflowed lands now in process of reclamation.

III. The total acreage included in said lands and to be included in the district aforesaid is 5,000 acres all in Klamath County, Oregon.

IV. The names of the owners of the above described land to be included in said district, as shown by the records of the county, and the acreage owned by each of such owners respectively are as follows:

(a) Geary Investment Company (a corporation) is the owner of one-half of the acreage described above as included in the proposed district.

(b) Robert H. Ellis is the owner of one-fourth of the acreage described above as included in the proposed district.

(c) J. C. Elliott King is the owner of one-fourth of the acreage described above as included in the proposed district.

V. Said district is to be organized for the construction, operation and maintenance of a drainage and irrigation system and the reclamation of said lands and protection thereof from the overflow of the Upper Klamath Lake and the natural drainage from the surrounding hills upon said land, and the proposed reclamation and protection aforesaid is for agricultural purposes and will be conducive to the public welfare and will be of public benefit.

VI. All the lands above described and to be included in said proposed district are and should be properly included therein, and will be beneficially affected by the operation of the proposed district.

VII. The benefits of such proposed reclamation and protection will exceed the cost incurred and any damage that may be done, and the best interests of the land aforesaid to be included in the district and of the owners of such land as a whole, and of the public at large, will be promoted by the formation and proposed operations of such district.

VIII. The formation of a drainage district under the provisions of the act aforesaid is a proper and advantageous method of accomplishing the reclamation and protection of the lands aforesaid to be included therein.

IX. The proposed plan of reclamation and protection is to provide where necessary, proper and suitable dikes to prevent the overflow of waters of Upper Klamath Lake, and to drain the lands by ditches or otherwise, supplementing said works by pumping plants or other methods affording drainage; to provide by canals, intakes and headgates and pumps, a more systematic, economical and efficient means of irrigation; and to provide protection as may be best suited to accomplish the purpose. Said lands in general are partially reclaimed swamp and overflow lands. Said lands are now protected from overflow by dikes, and an improve system of drainage and irrigation is in process of construction, and the proposed plan will include such additional dikes, drainage and irrigation canals and works as will be deemed necessary.

X. All of the undersigned petitioners have agreed, and do hereby agree, that they will pay any and all expenses incurred and any tax or taxes that may be levied against their lands respectively, for the purpose of paying the expense of organizing or attempting to organize the proposed district.

WHEREFORE your petitioners pray that the lands herein described, or such part of them as may be found by the court to be properly included

CUT PAY OF SECOND RATERS

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 1.—Boxers appearing in Portland next winter who are not of main event calibre and good drawing cards are due for a cut in pay, members of the Portland boxing commission and the

men who conduct the bouts at Milwaukie, near here, have ruled. Last winter, the officials said, the shows lost money but the boxers were always ahead for they were paid good sums for appearing.

Boxers who last winter were paid \$300 for appearing will be offered only \$250 this year. Those who received \$300 will get \$150. Guarantees above these amounts will be given only to main event men whose drawing power is known.

In addition to cutting down the

pay, the Portland and Milwaukie promoters are planning to reduce the length of the shows staged this winter. Twenty eight or thirty rounds will be staged on the show nights, instead of the longer matches held last winter.
