# ARIZONA VOTERS PREPARE FOR STATE PRIMARY

PHOENIX, Ariz., Sept. 2.—Arizona voters, at a primary election September 7, will choose party candidates for United States senator, member of the house of representatives, presidential electors, governor and other state offices. The candidates named at the primary will make the final race at the general election November 2.

Senator Marcus A. Smith, Democrat, of Tucson, Governor Thomas E. Campbell, Republican, of Prescott, and Representatives Carl Hayden, Democrat, of Phoenix, are candidates for nomination for the offices they hold.

Opposed to Senator Smith for the Democratic nomination are John W. Norton, Phoenix, R. C. Stanford, of Phoenix, and A. A. Worsley of Tucson. Candidates for the Republican senatorial nomination are Ralph H. Cameron, of Phoenix; E. S. Clark, of Prescott; Thomas Maddock, of Phoenix, and Edward M. Robison, of Flagstaff. Representative Hayden is unopposed in his own party and no Republicans are running for the nomination for his post.

Governor Campbell is the only Republican candidate for his office. Two Democrats, Secretary of State Mit Simms of Solomonville and Mulford Winsor of Yuma, are seeking their party nomination for governor.

Republican candidates for presidential electors, of which Arizona has three, are James P. Boyle, of Phoenix; John L. Gust, of Phoenix; Joseph W. Smith, of Snowflake, and Frank R. Stewart of Phoenix. Democratic candidates for presidential electors are B. F. Billingsley of Duncan, May Belle Craig of Phoenix and H. T. Southworth of Prescott.

Candidates for the other nominations are:

State auditor, Democratic, P. J. Munch, of Nogales; Republican, Charles W. Fairfield of Winslow.

State treasurer, Democratic, Raymond R. Earhart, of Nogales; Sam F. Webb of Phoenix; Republican, J. W. Estill of Tucson.

Attorney general, Democratic, Leslie C. Hardy of Nogales; Wiley E. Jones of Phoenix and Louis B. Whitney of Bisbee; Republican, W. J. Galbraith of Glendale.

Superintendent of public instruction, Democratic, C. O. Case, of Phoenix, and A. C. Peterson of Thatcher; Republican, Linwood S. Pratt of Lakeside and Elsie Toles of Tombstone.

Corporation commissioner, Democratic, I. C. E. Adams of Bisbee; T. D. Cashel of Phoenix and Loren Vaughn of Phoenix; Republican, no candidates.

State mine inspector, Democratic, G. H. Bolin of Bisbee; Tom C. Foster, of Lowell; Charles F. Hansen of Duncan; Harry Jennings of Bisbee; Edward Massey of Bisbee and Ed O'Hagan of Jerome; Republican, V. G. Mellgren of Tombstone and John F. White of Phoenix.

# JAPANESE WILL NOT NEGOTIATE WITH REPUBLIC

NOTE: The following statement between the Japanese and the Far Eastern Republic of Siberia was obtained by an Associated Press correspondent in the course of a journey from Vladivostok across Siberia and Russia to Moscow and Finland.

VERKHNE-UDINSK, Siberia, September 2.—(By Mail)—Representatives of the Far Eastern Republic recently established here have been frustrated in their efforts to make peace with the Japanese military command in Siberia by refusal of the latter to treat with them except as concerns territory west of Chita, according to a statement by A. M. Krasnotchekoff, Foreign Minister of the new Republic to The Associated Press correspondent. Parleys were broken off when the Russians insisted that the scope of negotiations should embrace the entire Far Eastern situation, should assume an international aspect instead of parleys between military commands, and between military commands and the military operations should be completely suspended while negotiations were in progress.

Efforts of the Far Eastern Republic to establish friendly relations with the Japanese even at the expense of surrender temporarily of sovereign rights to a wide belt of territory, were described by Krasnotchekoff, as follows:

"Parleys between the Japanese military mission and a mission of the Far Eastern Republic were begun on May 24 at the station Gongota, between the Japanese-Semenoff and Russian fronts, about 70 miles west of Chita. The Japanese mission, headed by Colonel Murosova, that the Soviet army must return west of Lake Baikal; that a neutral

zone be established west of Chita 170 miles in extent and containing no armed forces; that free transportation and communications be established and that the Japanese have representation in the railway management.

"The Russians replied that the Soviet army had not progressed beyond the left bank of the Selenga river, (southwest of Lake Baikal) and that the question of their return west of Lake Baikal must be taken up by Japan with Soviet Russia.

"The Far Eastern Republic mission proposed that the railway in the Chita and Stretensk districts be considered within the sphere of influence of the Japanese military command in Siberia temporarily, until evacuation could be reached; and that through transportation and communication be established eastward.

"The Russians insisted upon parleying regarding the Far Eastern situation as a whole, that fighting cease on all fronts, and that the negotiations assume the aspect of an international conference instead of parleys between two military commands.

"On May 25th the parleys were wished to discuss the situation west of Chita only, stating that they were not authorized to do more.

"On June 2 Krasnotchekoff sent a memorandum to General OI expressing surprise that the Japanese mission was not empowered to treat with the Russian mission and repeating the offer that the pre-Baikal railways be considered temporarily within the Japanese sphere of influence, thus practically renouncing sovereign rights in this territory for the sake of peace."

**CHINA TO TRAIN FLYERS**

SHANGHAI, July 30. (By Mail.)—In line with the Chinese government's purpose to train its own aviators to take charge of the country's future aeronautical development five young Chinese, who have been studying aviation at the Nan Yuan Aviation school, were sent to Manila this summer for post graduate training in flying at a school of aviation there.

NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—Old fashioned sandwichman publicity has been chosen by Dr. Robert Grimshaw, efficiency engineer and faculty member of New York university, for an attack on the high cost of groceries in the Washington heights section of this city.

Dr. Grimshaw served notice that grocers would have to cut their prices, or hear from him. Quotations remaining virtually unchanged, the doctor's bill-boarded sandwich

men paraded throughout Washington heights' main thoroughfares and market sections heralding the wholesale prices for garden truck showing a wide margin below retail costs.
