### NO DOUBT OBLIGATION IS OUTLAWED NOW

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 3.—An unpaid note for four shekels in silver bearing forty per cent annual interest for nearly four thousand years recently was found among the clay tablets at the University of Pennsylvania Museum by Dr. Leon Legrain. The note was given by a man named Bur-Mama to H Sinutium in October, 1962 B. C., the year in which King Rim-Sin occupied the town of Dur-Damigilish.

There were four witnesses to the note. Instead of signatures the witnesses placed their seals on the document and were not liable for payment unless it was shown they knew the character of Bur-Mama was bad when they swore it was good.

Although comparisons are difficult Dr. Legrain said, a shekel of silver at the time the note was made was equal to about \$100 at the present time.

## HARVARD STUDENTS REACH FRENCH POSTS

PARIS, Aug. 15. (By Mail).—The Harvard Reconstruction Group, made up of some 40 young student architects and engineers of the advanced grades at Harvard university, have left for their posts in the Argonne and Meuse regions to carry on their work of reconstruction in the devastated areas.

M. Ogier, minister of the liberated regions, received the group on its recent arrival here, and assured them the fullest facilities of the French government in carrying on their work. Five members of the mission were assigned to Rheims. Two of them are to work under the direction of M. Deneu, architect of the cathedral, in designing plans for the restoration of the famous basilica. Others are taking part in the gradual restoration of the old city back to its pre-war aspect.

At Sulpice four of the Harvard group are under the direction of M. Lavigne, government architect, in construction of standardized provisional houses of four and five rooms. At Somme-Py four others are drawing plans for the courthouse and school. Others are engaged in planning a modern system of gas, water and electricity for Somme-Py.

At Clermont-en-Argonne a group of 12 of the Harvard men are engaged in the work of reconstruction, which is carried on here at a vast extent, as this was the center of great destruction during the recoil of the Germans after their defeat on the Marne.
