

# BIG PROPERTY LOSS IN FIRE

Following is a revised property loss estimate of yesterday's fire. Owing to the extra hazard insurance rates were high and a generally light insurance was carried:

Houston hotel, owned by E. G. Harris of Paisley, Oregon; conducted by Mrs. W. B. Barnes. Loss \$40,000 on building, \$6,000 insurance; loss on furniture owned by Mrs. Barnes, \$5,000, no insurance.

Houston opera house block, including opera house, apartments, printery, etc., owned by J. V. Houston; loss between \$30,000 and \$40,000, insurance \$5,000.

Mrs. Amanda Hamaker, two residences on the northeast corner of Second and Main streets, occupied by Langtry and Connors families, probable loss \$3,000, no insurance.

Building on southeast corner of Second and Main, owned by Fred Page of Portland, gutted by fire, loss on building \$6,000, insurance unknown; ground floor occupied by Gilt Edge creamery who carried \$2,000 insurance; second floor apartments occupied by Joel T. Ward, whose furniture and belongings are total loss, \$1,500, insurance \$500; and C. F. Stone, partial loss, \$1,000; no insurance.

Pioneer Printery, in J. V. Houston's building, business owned by William Howdoin, John Johnck and W. L. Kibbee; stock and machinery loss \$7,000, insurance \$3,000; personal loss of Mr. Johnck in furniture, etc., \$5,000, insurance \$500.

Heidrich apartments and residence, owned by Mrs. E. Heidrich, value \$10,000, insurance \$4,500.

Lakeview rooming house, owned by A. F. Miller, loss \$5,000, no insurance.

Argaves rooming house, owned by J. L. Barkley, loss \$7,500, value; Mr. Barkley had \$1,500 insurance on the furnishing and \$2,000 on the building; Jasper Bennett, former owner, had \$3,000 on his equity in the building; furniture value \$2,500; loss above insurance about \$3,500.

J. A. Houston residence, value \$1,500, insurance \$1,000.

## CHIEF DID NOT WAIT FOR ALARM

The call sent in for the fire department by Bert C. Thomas was the third one received according to the records of the telephone office. The first call had been turned in, but even before it reached the department the men were preparing to start for the fire. Chief Ambrose states that he was awakened before any call came in and caught a glimpse of the flame. He called the men, and they were starting for the truck when the call came. No difficulty was experienced in getting started, and he drove directly to Second Main and laid a hose from there to First and Main, this being divided in the center and affording two streams on the fire. He then proceeded to lay other hose at strategic point before spotting the engine at Second and Klamath.

# CONFERENCE O. K. ON LABOR DAY PROGRAM

At a hurriedly called special meeting attended by the mayor, the city council, representative business and professional men, as well as leaders in the labor movement, the question of carrying out the programme of parade, sports and dance scheduled for Labor Day was thoroughly discussed.

Mayor Struble held the view that as no good could be done the victims of the catastrophe at the Houston fire, it would be inadvisable to cancel arrangements, especially as there were large numbers of outside visitors in town attracted by the advance notices. Councilman Upp also spoke, concurring in the mayor's stand.

An address was made by Chas. J. Ferguson, who was appealing in the extreme. Mr. Ferguson, who but recently suffered a great bereavement, said that those still living knew that at some unknown time, they too must pass out.

"Those victims of the fire" said Mr. Ferguson, "are, possibly, happier than are we here today. Let us then, realize that, with so little sunshine in the world, it behooves us to add what mite we can to the happiness of the living. The dead are gone—they cannot be recalled; those who will gather today for a little brief pleasure in the midst of humdrum life should not be disappointed. Perchance those who are gone, could their voices be heard, would say to us to proceed and give sunshine while we may." Mr. Ferguson's little talk was received in a deep silence, more impressive than applause.

The secretary of the labor council, W. F. Kay, in a brief speech stated that the question of proceeding with the day's programme was laid before those present as citizens only. No question of organized labor was involved. "With deepest sympathy for those who have gone" said Mr. Kay, "we must still remember that we owe a duty to the living. A train filled with workers is now on its way from Weed. The people coming to visit us are expecting to enjoy a little brief respite from their daily toil and have incurred discomfort and expense to be with us. There is no intention of celebrating. Our outing will be tinged with sadness, because as I speak, there are an unknown number of bodies of working people being searched for amongst the ruins. But we will drape our banners with crape; we will do our share towards taking care of the unfortunate sufferers. To dance will be unthinkable, and we cannot even consider that part of the program. But in my personal opinion, we are in duty bound to carry out our obligations."

A rising vote was then taken, and it was unanimously decided to go ahead with the morning and afternoon programmes. A subscription list was passed around and a considerable sum secured, which was turned over to the mayor, as the nucleus of a relief fund.

The Rev. B. P. Lawrence stated that the Red Cross local chapter was completing plans to take care of the cases arising out of the disaster.
