league in Oregon. He said he had investigated the league's activities in the state and placed a conservative estimate of the present membership in the state at 10,000, and told specific facts of investigations to bear out his estimate.

"We have all read of the great injury done to the state of North Dakota by this organization. Taxes there are 300 per cent higher than before the advent of the league and North Dakota has been plunged into virtual state socialism. The league feeds itself upon the dissatisfaction of the farmers and if we would keep its tenacious fingers off the throat of Oregon we must meet the farmer more than half way in the solution of his problems.

"The State Taxpayers League has instituted a measure providing for a state market commissioner. This measure is similar to the one in California and provides for state leadership in the organization and operation of producers, co-operative selling organizations. The California law proved of great benefit to the farmers of that state. And the Non-partisan league has openly stated it will not attempt to invade California so long as the market commission act is in force there, as it has effectively removed a great many of the cases which the league is enabled to enlarge upon and to propose curative as a cover to its real aim, state socialism."

GIVE TEN DAYS FOR STEALING NEWSPAPERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.—Emile Guerrin was convicted of petty larceny and was sentenced to ten days in the county jail by Police Judge Morris Oppenheim for stealing newspapers from doorsteps in the neighborhood of Fourteenth and Guerrero streets. He was arrested early Monday morning by Policemen Barrion and Brown who caught him taking copies of a daily paper.
