ENGLISH VICTUALS ARE DEGENERATING

LONDON, Aug. 21. (By Mail).—A reporter for a London newspaper who considers himself an epicure has just finished an extensive study of London restaurants and reached the conclusion that English restaurant cooking has degenerated to an extent almost unbelievable. He complained that he could not find a good old-fashioned English steak, that a juicy mutton chop with a piece of kidney attached was difficult to obtain, that the pastry of the meat pies the Englishman loves so well no longer is light and fluffy and that the omnipresent jellies lacked their old-time taste.

The famous Soho eating places, too, have lost much of their old-time charm. Soho, says one writer, "is that district famous for its league of smells, for its children—slee-eyed swarthy bimbos, its lithe shawled Madonnas and its little restaurants." It is the Latin quarter of London. Soho is reaping a harvest because so many people are "eating out" owing to the high cost of maintaining a kitchen but it is doing it at the cost of losing the atmosphere the real habitue enjoyed. And many of the "regulars" have had to give up their favorite places owing to increase in prices and because they disliked to dine near people who do not appreciate perfectly prepared food and who never seem to assimilate the atmosphere of these quaint places.

4300 STUDENTS TOOK TRAINING IN PAST YEAR

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON. Eugene, Sept. 10.—With a total attendance of 2,065 students on the campus at Eugene taking regular work during the fall, winter, spring and summer quarters, a total of 1,486 students enrolled for university work in Portland, and 811 students enrolled for irregular work, the University of Oregon is becoming an institution which functions practically all of the time. Instruction has been continuous from the opening of school last September until the close of summer school in August, except for a few days between terms. Although university work will not commence again until September 29, many students are at present carrying work in the correspondence school of the university.

One thousand, seven hundred and thirty-eight undergraduate students were enrolled in the regular three-term year of the university while 47 graduate students were enrolled during the summer session, making a total of 2,065 students on the campus during the past year.

The enrollment in the schools in Portland during the past year totaled 1,486, including 370 students in the summer school, 104 in the medical school, and 1,112 in extension classes. Music special students, 127 in number plus 648 correspondence school students, make a grand total of 4,302 students, who took advantage of higher educational courses offered by the University of Oregon during the year 1919-1920.
