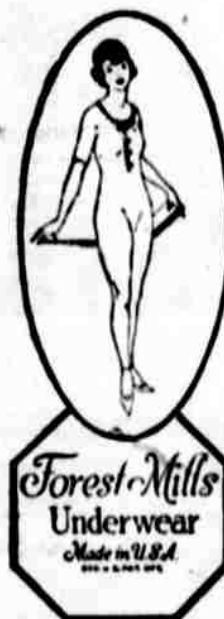

AT THE THEATERS

Snow scenes for moving pictures are about as obtainable in sunny California as iced Martinis on the Sahara.

Nevertheless, in J. Warren Kerrigan's latest Brunton feature, "No. 99," which will be the attraction at the Liberty Theatre Saturday, some of the most picturesque snow scenes ever photographed are shown.

The script for the new feature called for a number of scenes at the elaborate country estate of a New York millionaire. The Brunton technical director considered it no trick to build a palatial mansion but was palpably puzzled at the idea of covering it with snow and ice. Finally Mr. Brunton suggested that the set be built near the summit of Mt. Baldy, a Sierra peak not far from Los Angeles which is snow-clad eight months out of the year.

Accordingly timber, marble blocks, bricks and mortar were carried on mule-back seven thousand feet to the top of the peak. There, on a plateau several acres in extent, a handsome country place was erected. The set was allowed to stand for several days until a storm covered it with snow. The company was then brought up and the winter scenes were filmed. Supporting the star in "No. 99" are: Frital Brunetto, the popular leading woman, and Kathleen Kerrigan, sister of the star.

When Dustin Farnum, the screen star, admits that his new picture, "Big Happiness," handed him more thrills than he has experienced in all his career, it's a good sign his audiences are going to be more than satisfied.

All of these thrills are awaiting the public when "Big Happiness," a Robertson-Cole super-special opens

at the Liberty Theatre next Sunday.

During the course of this colorful drama Mr. Farnum is thrown from his horse, rescues his leading lady when she is about to be trampled to death; is shipwrecked and reaches a country far from his home; becomes a victim of malaria fever; is reported dead; loses his wealth and identity, only to live happily everafter. How he does it can not be revealed until the opening night.

One of the most elaborate ball

room scenes ever screened is shown in Cynthia Stockley's "April Folly," Marion Davies' latest Cosmopolitan Production, which is being released by Famous Players-Lasky Corporation and will be shown at the Star Theatre tonight.
